Endeavors Will Be Made to Have School Pupils Help in Gardening.—The Schools Committee Met on Monday.

The Schools Committee on greater production held a meeting on Monday afternoon in the Board of Education rooms attended by J. G. Elliott (chairman), Inspector Stuart, Principal Sitter, William Cook and John Nicolle. After consideration it was decided to have addresses delivered in the schools on Wednesday afternoon of "What Can Little Hands Do to Aid in Greater Production." The Separate School Board will arrange for its speakers. The public schools will be addressed by these: Victoria, Prof. W. T. McClement; Macdonald, Rev. J. D. Ellis; Frontenac, Inspector Stuart; Louise school, Messrs. W. H. Macnoe and J. G. Elliott; Central school, John Macdonald. After the holidays a meeting will be arranged with the teachers to keep on the work, meantime literature on gardening will be secured for distribution.
