A LECTURE AND A CONCERT Was Troubled With Shortness of Breath.

GIVEN IN FIRST BAPTIST BIBLE SCHOOL HALL.

Capt. Finney Tells of His Experiences at the Front—A Splendid Musical Programme. Under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid, an enjoyable entertainment was held in the First Baptist Bible School Hall last evening. Prof. Buchanan of Queen's was chairman, and a good audience was in attendance. Several selections were given by Salsbury's orchestra, all of which were enthusiastically received. Little Stuart Salsbury marched to the platform with a British flag over his shoulder. He was obliged to respond to an encore. The little Misses Lorraine Leslie and Vera Sawyer sang a duet very nicely. Capt. Finney, who has just returned from the front, gave a vivid and interesting account of his experiences from the time he left Kingston in 1914, until his return to England, after serving for a length of time at the front in France and Belgium. His recital of experiences on the field, when the shot and shell of the enemy were falling around him and his men, was very interesting to say the least. He had with him a gas helmet, the use of which he explained. He had with him also a sample of tear goggles. These are used as a protection from a gas the enemy sometimes uses, which very seriously affects the eyes. He had also other interesting souvenirs. Capt. Finney gave a word picture of the German air craft which at times circled round over the campment. Beautiful solos were well sung by F. Edmondson, Miss Edna Singleton, Reclah Tandy, Mrs. T. Turner and Mrs. Horton. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered those who had furnished the evening's entertainment, on motion of the pastor and Alderman Litton. A fine selection by the orchestra and the national anthem closed the evening. A liberal offering was left with the Ladies' Aid.
