The local telegraph companies were put out of business Friday, as a result of Thursday night's sleet storm. The local fire alarm system also suffered as a result of the storm.

The new provincial election act gives customs officials, postmasters and inland revenue officers in cities and towns a vote in provincial elections. Up to the present they have been barred.

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Electric wires set fire to a telephone pole at the corner of Ontario and Clarence streets, at 4 o'clock Friday morning. A stay wire running into the office of the C.P.R. freight shed was charged and a slight blaze occurred at the office door.

## OPENING NEW CITY DAIRY

O. J. Robinson and L. Morrison Are Proprietors of New Industry.

The Whig takes pleasure in introducing this new dairy to its readers, which is situated at 24 Johnson street, built of pressed brick. The proprietors are O. J. Robinson, formerly of Point Pleasant Dairy, and L. Morrison. While Mr. Morrison is practically a new man in this business, Mr. Robinson having over ten years experience in the retail dairy business, is very well-known to the people of Kingston.

The dairy is equipped with the latest machinery, capable of handling pasteurized milk and cream in the most sanitary manner. There is a large steam boiler to run the bottle washer and sterilizer which are necessary in the handling of the bottled milk. Mr. Robinson was the first dairyman to bottle milk after the Clarified Milk went out of business. The bottle business has since been increasing. Now there is a city law calling for all milk to be bottled, but it seems as though this has not been enforced, for one of the milk vendors remarked at the last meeting they had, that he was going to "stop out" as long as he could, that this by-law will be enforced.

In connection with the City Dairy, a four-ton artificial ice plant is being installed, which will be capable of handling a large quantity of milk. There is a refrigerator in this building, 16 feet long, 12 feet wide, and 10 feet high. City Dairy has made arrangements with H. B. Smith, who is appointed by the Dominion Government, to make a test and an official report will be given in the paper monthly. This has never been done before by any other dairy. Mr. Robinson claims there should be a city inspector to do this work as two-thirds of the milk vendors are not producers, and the remaining lot produce some milk and buy the rest. There has only been a test taken once a year, and last year no test at all. It seems as though there is no law for the Kingston dairy man. It is the intention of this dairy after first of May to make early delivery, so that all their customers will have milk for breakfast. This will be appreciated.
