INCREASE OF PRODUCTION

POULTRY COMMITTEE CONDUCTING A HOUSE-TO-HOUSE CANVASS

In Order to Secure a Census of City Regarding Citizens Who Are Raising Poultry—Ward Chairman Have Been Appointed.

The Poultry Committee of the Greater Production Committee is very active under the able chairmanship of William Cook. The members of the committee are doing all they can to promote poultry raising and increased production in the city.

The committee is down to work on a systematic basis. Ward chairmen have been appointed, and they will make a house-to-house canvass of the city, to ascertain how many are engaged in poultry raising, to what extent, and to take up the question of increased production and all the information that will be required.

The following ward chairmen have been selected: H. Walsh, 11 St. Catharines street; Mr. Williams, 264 Rideau street; John Fleming, 225 Earl street; W. A. Patterson, 106 Victoria street; E. A. Turner, 138 Nelson street; M. C. Dunn, 25 Mack street; Charles Anglin, 35 Wellington street.

The members of the poultry committee are very anxious to give all the information they can to citizens who are desirous of making a start in the poultry end of the movement for increased production, and which by the way, is one of the most important.

Just as soon as the census of the city has been taken, and the information has been tabulated, the poultry committee will hold a meeting, and get busy to bring results.

Greater Production Circular. J. W. Bradshaw, county clerk, is sending circular letters to the reeves of the county asking for township councils to take up the Greater Production Movement and have every public spirited citizen resident to aid in every way.

Your Township Council to meet and consider: (1) Greater Production of Food stuffs; (2) actual needs of your district in respect of labor; (3) registration somewhere (preferably at Government office at Kingston) and record of scale of wages payable to men and boys; (4) to get in touch with school teachers, and find how many boys are available for service; (5) to ask clergymen to interest people in matter of such vital importance, for increased production of all farm and garden products in view of world shortage of food stuffs.

OBITUARY

The Late Rev. Dr. Cobb.

Rev. Dr. A. J. Cobb, rector of Wellington, Ont., died on Easter Sunday after a painful illness of some months' duration. The late Dr. Cobb was born in England, fifty-four years ago, and was ordained in the Diocese of Algoma in 1891. After fourteen years of service in that diocese he became rector of St. Mark's, Port Hope, in 1905, removing thence to Lancaster in 1909. In 1912 he became rector of Wellington, in the Diocese of Ontario.

DR. W. T. CONNELL MAKING EXAMINATION Superintendent of Dairy School Investigating Case of Poisoned Cheese.

A sensation was sprung at Osgoode, in Carleton County, a few days ago when several of the residents took violently ill as a result, it is thought, of eating poisoned cheese. A student who left the Kingston Dairy School last week for that place, made an investigation and has forwarded a sample of the cheese to the city.

L. A. Zuffelt, superintendent of the school, asked Dr. W. T. Connell to make an examination and analysis, which it is expected will be completed in a few days. In the meantime the most intense interest has been shown by the Osgoode residents as to the result of the examination.

In an interview Mr. Zuffelt said that unlike milk, which will in itself create a chemical action and become poisoned, cheese will last indefinitely without such a chemical action taking place. The only way in which the cheese could become poisonous would be by some person doing it, perhaps deliberately.

Exports Tremendous. The exports from Kingston for January, February and March of 1917 total \$593,993.48, a big increase over the same period of last year, which amounted to \$483,586.50. The report indicates the tremendous prosperity which has come to this district lately.
