WHEN THE "ORLEANS" REACHED BORDEAUX




When the German Government announced the now famous U-boat decree last February it seemed for a time that it would completely paralyze American shipping. However, two ships, the "Rochester" and the "Orleans," both of the American line, weighed anchor and departed for French ports. Both arrived safely and our picture shows the "Orleans" docking at Bordeaux. A huge crowd assembled there to welcome the crew.




Miss Loretta Walsh, of Philadelphia, first woman to enlist in U. S. navy.
