14TH REGIMENT CAMPAIGN
GETTING STARTED ON WORK OF RAISING FORCE.

St. Mary's Bugle Band Called Attention to the Gathering at the Armouries—Planning for the Campaign.

The 14th Regiment campaign for recruits for the Canadian Defence Force started on Wednesday evening at the Armouries. At seven o'clock St. Mary's bugle band marched through the principal streets and made the air ring with the bugle sounds that in former spring seasons reminded people that the 14th were getting ready to turn out. When the band arrived at the Armouries shortly after eight quite a good crowd had gathered, nearly all ex-members of the regiment.

The offer of assistance in the securing of men was freely made by those who are ineligible and by quite a number who have already fought in France. The men who came down last night were looking for all the information about the new force that they could get and the officers were kept busy asking and answering questions.

A meeting of officers was held late in the evening and plans discussed for the filling up of the regiment. A recruiting office may be opened on Princess street and signs will be placed on the street corners directing men to the office in the Armouries which is easy to find and open all day and every evening. The phone number is 185.

What was formerly the 14th orderly rooms at the corner of Bagot and Barrack streets, in the stone building, are now to be used as the regiment's quartermaster's stores.

OBITUARY

Late James A. G. Fokes.

On Good Friday morning there passed to his reward a former Kingstonian in the person of James A. G. Fokes, son of the late E. J. Fokes, who for many years was a well-known Princess street barber. The deceased, who was residing in Toronto, had been ill only ten days with pneumonia when the end came. Educated in Kingston public schools, he entered Gardner's biscuit factory early in life to learn baking. Later he was employed at similar work with the Mooney Company of Stratford, and last fall severed his connection with this firm to enter a more lucrative position in Toronto with the Telfer Biscuit Company as head baker. His age at the time of death was thirty-one years. There are left to mourn his loss his wife (formerly Mrs. Nellie Armour, of Stratford) and three small children, Violet, William and Edward; also his mother, one brother, Rev. Alex. F. Fokes, B.A., B.D., of Riceville, Ont., and two sisters, Mrs. Wayne McQuinn, of Raymondville, N.Y., and Mrs. Paul Chambers, Watertown, N.Y. In Kingston the deceased was a regular attendant at Queen street Methodist church and Sunday school, and shortly after went to Stratford attached himself to the Methodist church there, and became as well an active worker in the Men's Brotherhood. The funeral was conducted at the home by Dr. Ferguson, the pastor of Perth avenue Methodist church, Toronto, after which the remains were deposited in Prospect cemetery.

SPECIAL MEDICAL COURSE

Is To Be Held For Returned Soldiers At Queen's.

A special medical course of instruction is to be held at Queen's University for the twenty-six men who have returned from Queen's General Hospital in France. The course will last for thirteen weeks during the summer months, and will comprise the regular third year medical work so that the men may be able to enter on their final year work at the beginning of the next session in the fall.

HEROIC WORK OF CHAPLAINS

Told by Rev. Dr. Thurlow Fraser, Back From the Front.

The Toronto News says: Shorn of heroics of any kind it yet a tale of intense interest and one that gives a singularly clear idea of the chaplain's duties at the front that Capt. the Rev. Dr. Thurlow Fraser related to The News.

Capt. Fraser has just arrived in Toronto and is en route home to Owen Sound. He went overseas in October, 1915, with an Alberta unit. For ten months he has been in France, at the front all the time. Four months have been spent in Belgium. For two months Capt. Fraser was on the Somme, and for four months on Vimy Ridge and in the Loos salient.

Speaking of the fighting on the 13th of last June, during which a long strip of trenches was taken by the Canadians, Captain Fraser told of the stretcher-bearing parties which were organized and of Major A. M. Gordon, the son of Principal Gordon, Queen's University, so covered with blood and mud that he looked more like a real combatant than anything else. Another instance was recorded of a Canadian chaplain, Major A. H. McGreer, who, discovering a party of wounded Canadians far forward in a most dangerous spot, returned for food and drink and bore it to them at great personal hazard. Then securing a large party of stretcher-bearers he guided them back by night and all the wounded were borne away in safety.
