Crops Can Be Increased by at Least Fifteen Yer Cent.

Brain instead of brawn is being advocated as a means to greater production, in a circular just issued from the office of the commissioner of agricul-ture. It advises the farmers to sow only the plumpest seed, claiming that it will result in at feast 15 per cent. increase in crops here. It states that the wheat crop in Ontario can by this TOPPED the wheels of means be increased by 4,000,000 bushels; the barley crop by 1,750,000 bushels; the oat crop by 17,000,000; and the crop of peas by 500,000 bush-

"Select from your granary three times the amount of grain required for seed purposes. By use of the fanning mill, clean and reclean until you have just sufficient for seed purposes," says the circular.
