Treat Your Seed Grain for Smut

Although smut was not so prevalent last year it is possible for this disease to cause trouble again this year unless preventative measures are taken. To treat as outlined below is insuring against losses and hence it is advisable to treat as follows:-

Mix one pint of Formalin with 5 gallons of water or 2 table-spoonfuls to 1 pail of water. Place the grain to be treated in a heap on clean canvas or floor. Sprinkle the Formalin solution over the grain, then shovel. Repeat this until every grain is moistened by the solution; then cover the pile with sack and leave for 3 or 4 hours. At the end of this time spread the grain out thinly to dry, shovelling it over three or four times will hasten the drying. Forty gallons of the Formalin solution is sufficient to sprinkle forty or fifty bushels of grain, smaller amounts in proportion.

Immersing the grain in a bag is sometimes practiced and is equally effective.

Americans in Our Army.
Toronto, April 17.—(To the Editor): A few days ago there appeared in a Toronto newspaper under the heading of "Canadian Press" Despatch," and of date, New York, April 13th, a statement from which I quote:

"A special cable to the Herald from London, dated yesterday, says: 'The prospect of the early participation of American troops fighting under the American flag on the western front has caused tremendous enthusiasm here. 'Already the nucleus for a force is at grips with the Prussians in France, it being estimated that 32,000 American citizens are fighting in the Canadian units. It is surmised here that a request will be made to obtain the release of the 32,000 trained fighters from the Canadian units to enable them to fight hereafter under their own flag.'

"The force could be strengthened by the addition of about 10,000 regulars to be sent from the United States army at once, thus forming a powerful army corps, which, in the forthcoming operations, would bear a part as glorious as that borne by Field Marshal French's first gallant little expeditionary force."

"While not for a moment thinking of detracting in any way from the credit due to those American citizens who are gallantly assisting us, I think in justice to our own men the following facts should be made known:

"I had occasion to make speeches in the Senate towards the end of the last session of Parliament on recruiting and also on registration and the figures I obtained in connection with the preparing of these speeches were official in every instance. Up to March 31st, 1916, out of a total of some 200,000 enlistments, the foreign born numbered 10,000; from this total of 10,000 there must be deducted Russians, French, Greeks, Italians and other foreign reservists or patriots, who naturally preferred the facilities given in the Canadian army to those in their own distant forces, so probably not more than 5,000 of this total were Americans, and as the proportion of native Canadians enlisting increased after March, 1916, the outside total of Americans in our 400,000 men training in Canada and England or fighting at the front would be barely 7,500, with less than half that number actually in France."

"In view of this it is difficult to understand why such statements should be made and I trust the press of Canada will do its best to correct this erroneous American impression, more especially as I am told the New York papers the other day were sold on the streets to the cry of 'Great American Victory at Vimy.'"

FITZROY LEAD MINES SOLD

Important Mining Deal of Interest to Arnprior and Vicinity.

Arnprior Watchman. D. J. Campbell has sold the lead mines, situated on an island in Lavan's bay, Fitzroy township, to a syndicate of wealthy railroad contractors. The claims extend 800 feet over one-half mile long and the lead ore crops up here and there along the trend of the vein for over five hundred feet and runs from 10 inches to five feet wide and is within 800 feet of the Canadian Northern railway track. The practical lead miners claim it to be as good a lead deposit as there is in Canada. The company intends to operate the mines after the spring freshet is over, and ship the ore to be treated at Kingston. The freight rates to Kingston are approximately \$2 per ton. Galena after it is smelted is worth \$200 per ton. The Canadian Northern railway will very likely run a spur to the mines and up to Arnprior a distance of about four and a half miles.

The lead mines in Fitzroy township have been owned by D. J. Campbell for years but owing to there being no place in Ontario where the lead ore could be smelted the mines have remained in a state of undevelopment. This condition of affairs created more or less trouble for Mr. Campbell. Some years ago one of the Hamilton smelters, who had been urged upon the government the advisability of donating \$50,000 for the purpose of assisting in the erection of a smelter and refinery in Ontario for the purpose of treating lead ore. The government refused assistance. About two months ago the smelter at Kingston was put in a position to treat and handle lead ore.

The question now is: Would it not be cheaper to ship the ore to the smelter at Kingston for treatment, than to load a smelter on the island where the lead mines are located? Coke is cheaper at Kingston and that city is nearer the leading markets. Shipments can be made from Kingston by either rail or water. Last year in Montreal alone \$6,000,000 worth of lead was used. Lead ore can be easily smelted and can be treated without concentrating by
