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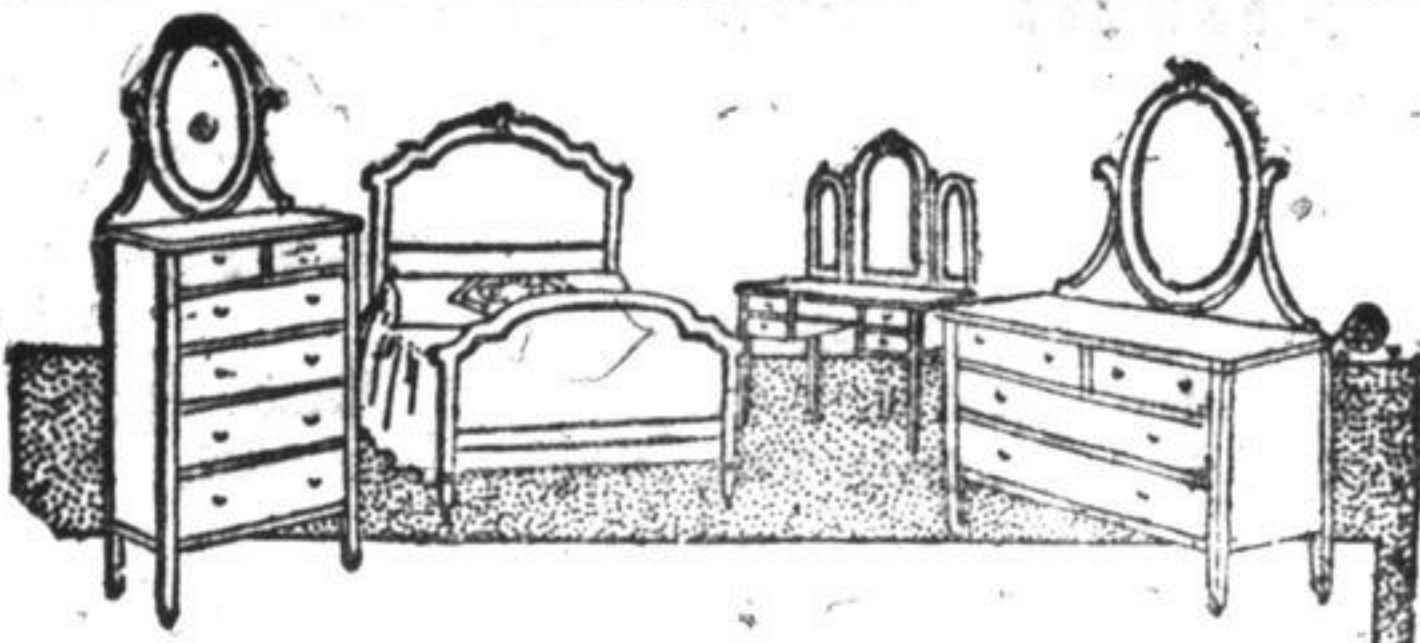

AN APPEAL WAS MADE AT THE FRONTENAC CHEESE BOARD.

G. G. Pablow Asked for Increased Production and a Better Quality—Good Prices Assured for This Season.

An appeal for a greater production and a better quality of cheese was made by G. G. Pablow, chief dairy inspector for Eastern Ontario, at the inaugural meeting of the Frontenac Cheese Board, held on Thursday afternoon in the agricultural rooms on Market street.

Addresses were also delivered by Anthony Rankin, M.P.P. and Joseph Cramer, the "Cheese King" of Frontenac County. William M. Fitzgerald, of Murvale, occupied the chair, and there was a large attendance of members.

Mr. Pablow asked the cheesemen to rally to the support of the Kingston Board and make it one of the best in Ontario. This district, he said, should be well represented on the board.

After the addresses, two hundred boxes of cheese were boarded, and one lot was sold at 23 1/4 cents. L. W. Murphy was the purchaser. Two factories boarded white cheese, Glenburnie 29 and Glenvale 49, while two factories boarded colored cheese, Model 69 and Cold Springs 79.

The buyers present were L. W. Murphy, John Gibson, George Smith and F. Thompson.

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There was no doubt but what the prices paid on the local board would equal any other board. The prospects for good prices were bright. There would be a great demand for all goods manufactured, and the speaker urged the members to turn out as much as possible. Special care should be taken in the feeding of the cows. Patrons should be induced to see that they were well fed. With proper feeding it would be possible to turn out more milk with the same number of cows. If any trouble was met with at any of the factories, an instructor should be sent for at once.

"Think of the boys at the front," said Mr. Pablow. It is your duty to produce as much as you can. And not only to produce more, but to have it of a better quality. I think if all the makers will do the best they can everything will be all right.

Anthony Rankin, M.P.P., extended a hearty welcome to the members of the Cheese Board to the new quarters, and said that he wanted the farmers to make use of them for their meetings. He also stated that rest rooms had been provided for the ladies, and he wanted them to make use of them. The city was co-operating in the furnishing of the rooms. Speaking on feeding he urged the members to keep green fodder fit for the dry periods. He spoke of the shortage of beef, and the Standard Dairy Act, which would likely be up again at the next session. Two-thirds of the farmers of Ontario were in favor of it, but in Eastern Ontario, where dairying was the chief industry, Mr. Rankin promised to uphold the industry.
