**THE LATE MRS. R. H. TOYE**

**ONE OF KINGSTON'S MOST ACTIVE WOMEN WORKERS**

In Every Good Cause Has Passed to Rest—Her Memory Will be Gratefully Remembered.

The death occurred at eleven o'clock on Thursday morning of another of Kingston's most active and successful workers in every good cause. We refer to the late Mrs. R. H. Toye. She had been long ailing, but continued until the last to manifest the cheerful disposition which was so characteristic of her. She deepened the affection with which she was regarded by so many friends through her thoughtful works and deeds, notwithstanding her long illness.

Mrs. Toye was the only daughter (Eliza Jane) of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Crothers, of Northport, and coming to Kingston many years ago at once identified herself with the Methodist Church, the Y.M.C.A. (of the Woman's Auxiliary of which she was president for over twenty years), and the various auxiliaries of the Queen Street Methodist Church. She carried into each the influence of her strong and helpful personality.

Workers of her character, having the keen discernment which every cause requires, and acting generally with a remarkably clear vision, are very rare. Mrs. Toye was able to lead in many philanthropic movements, and her voice and influence, so kindly yet so dominating, will be greatly missed.

She was not only a woman of marked capability, but she was zealous in every good work, tireless in application, and exceedingly able, in her management of affairs.

It was a matter of profound regret when her steady hand was removed from the various church and charitable associations with which she was identified, and all Kingston, without regard to class, can very fittingly lay the white flower of a blameless life upon her grave. Her memory will surely be gratefully remembered.

She is survived by her husband, also by three brothers—Hutchinson Crothers and W. J. Crothers, of Kingston, and Hon. T. W. Crothers, of Ottawa, the Minister of Labor in the Federal Government. An only daughter, Mrs. Arthur Lingham, Montreal, was with her when she so peacefully passed away.

The funeral (private) will take place on Saturday, Rev. J. D. Ellis conducting the service at 82 Gore street.

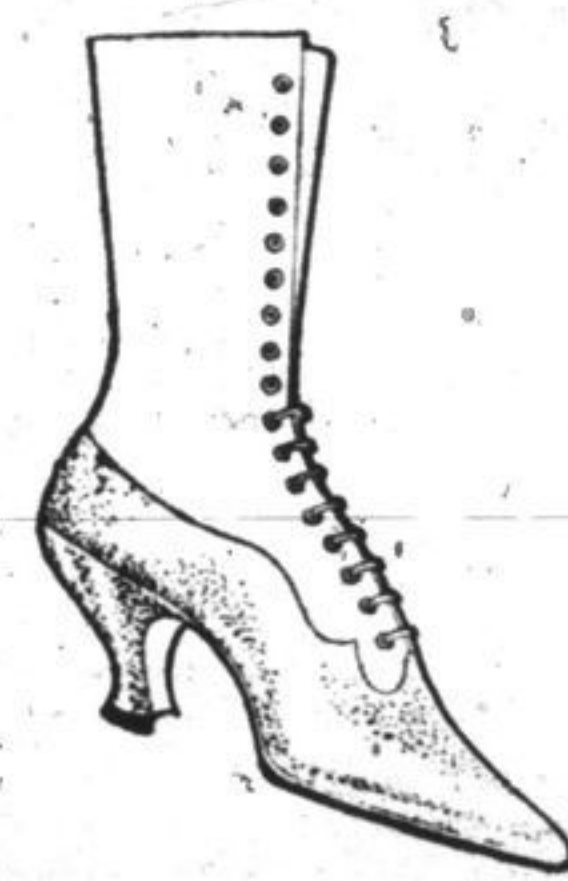
**MADE A PRESENTATION.**
