### DEPOSE HOHENZOLLERN

And the Allies Will be Ready to Talk Peace.

London, April 20.—Maximilian Harden and other German radical leaders are openly demanding speedy constitutional reforms, giving Germany a responsible, Parliamentary Government, and are declaring that the Allies are unwilling to stop fighting until Germany equips herself with a democratic government that can make a real and permanent peace. The voice of the nation, particularly telling Germany that the longed for peace is possible whenever the Hohenzollerns are deposed.
