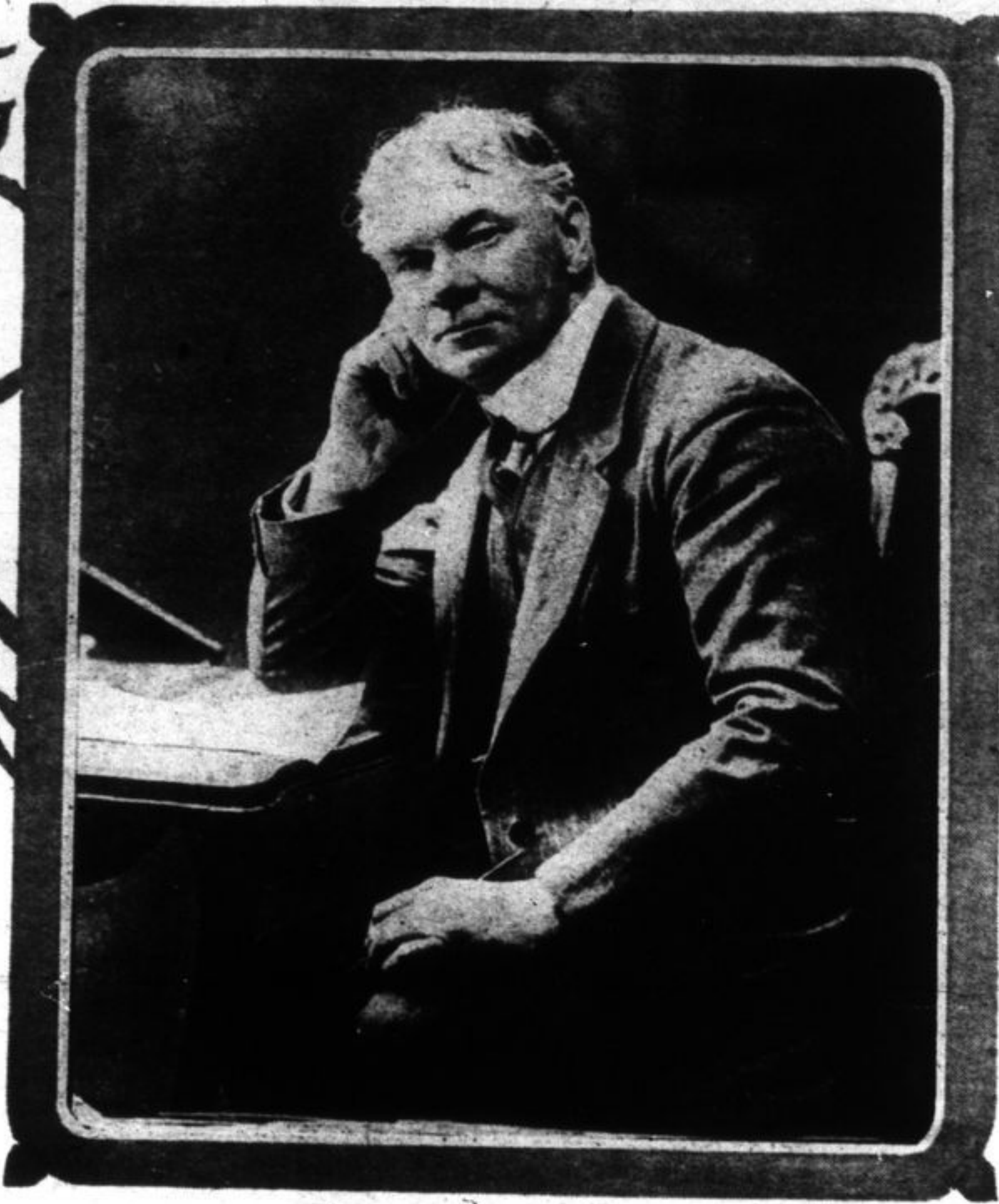

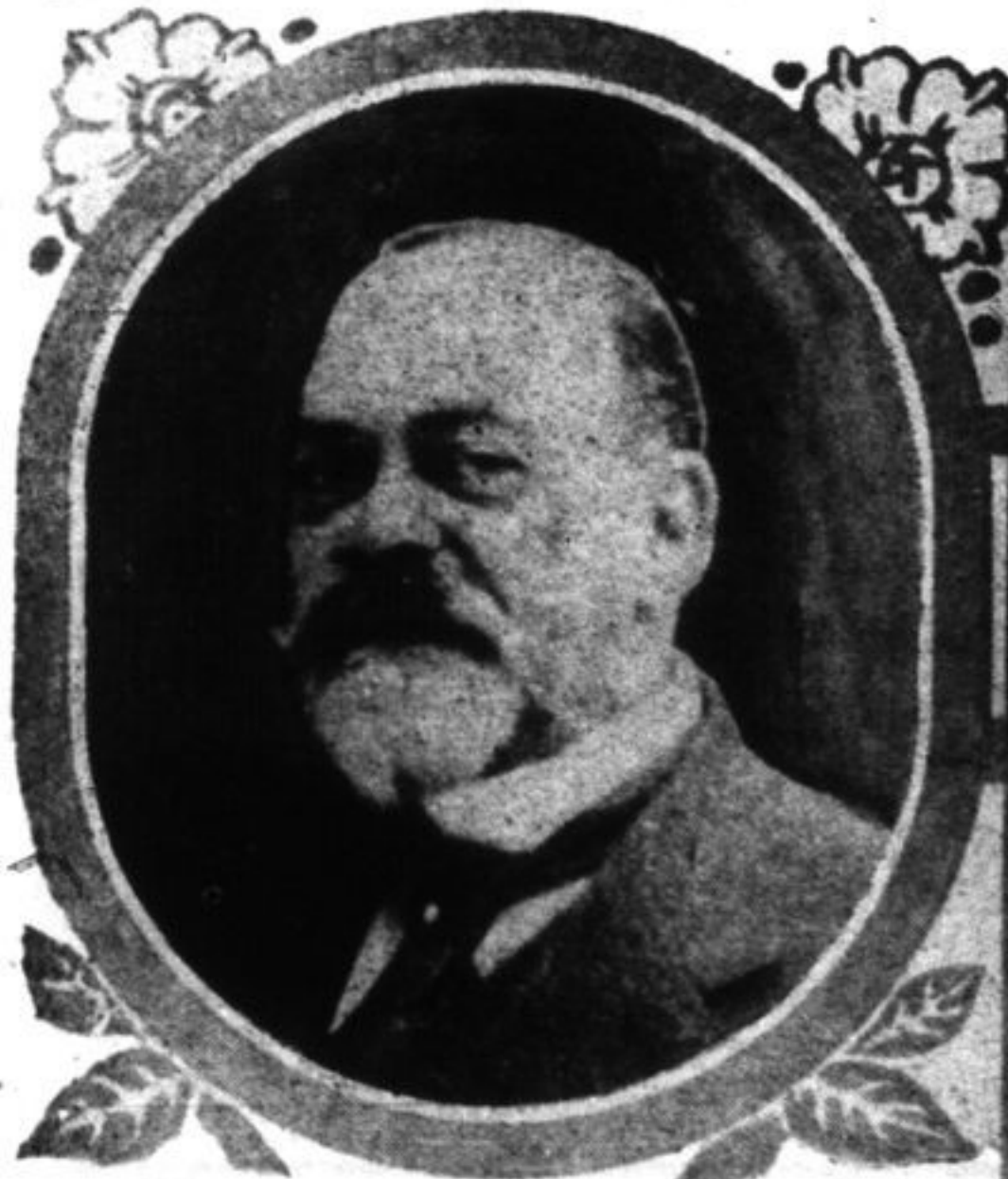

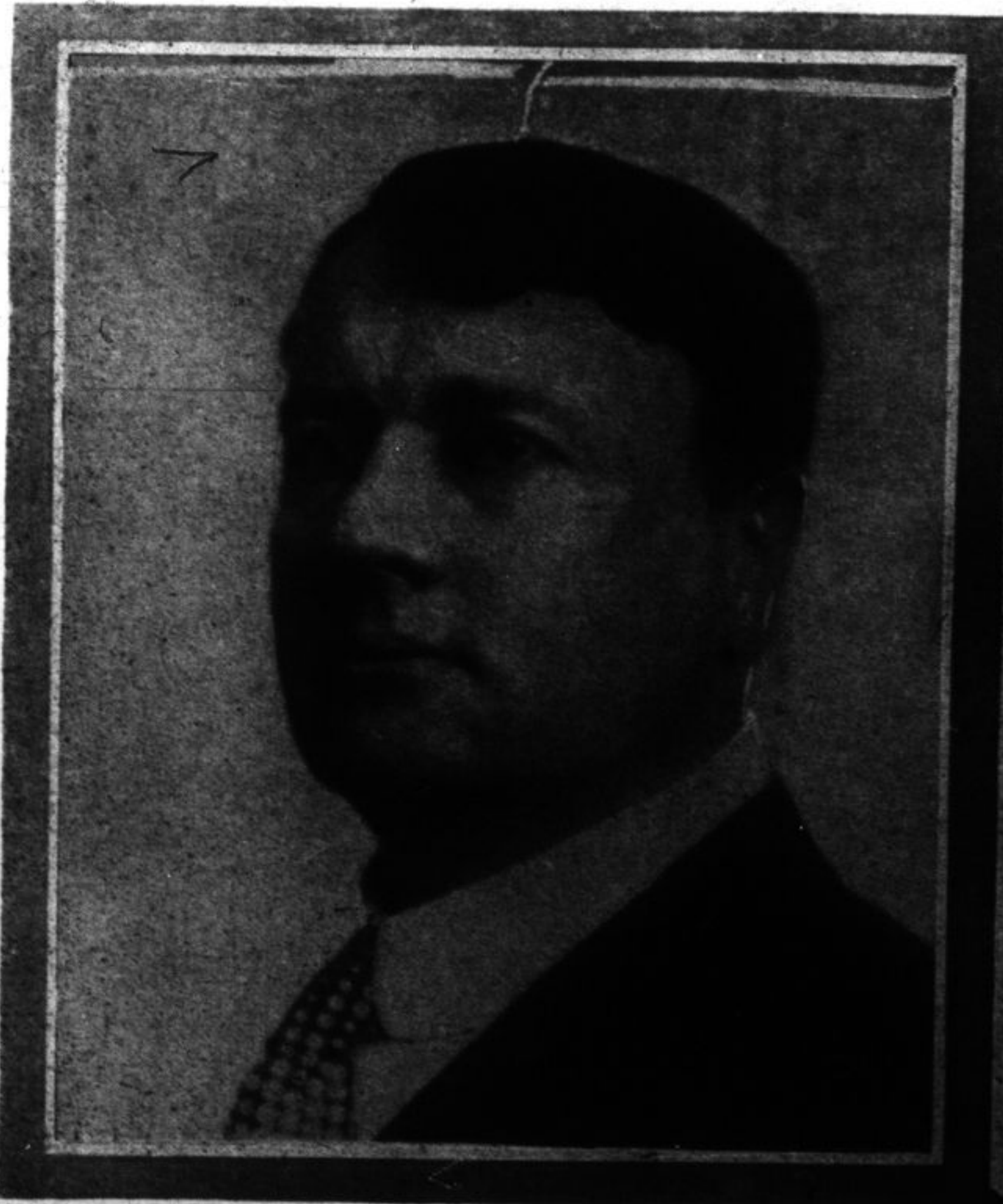
Lady Spring-Rice, wife of the British Ambassador to the United States, and her children.



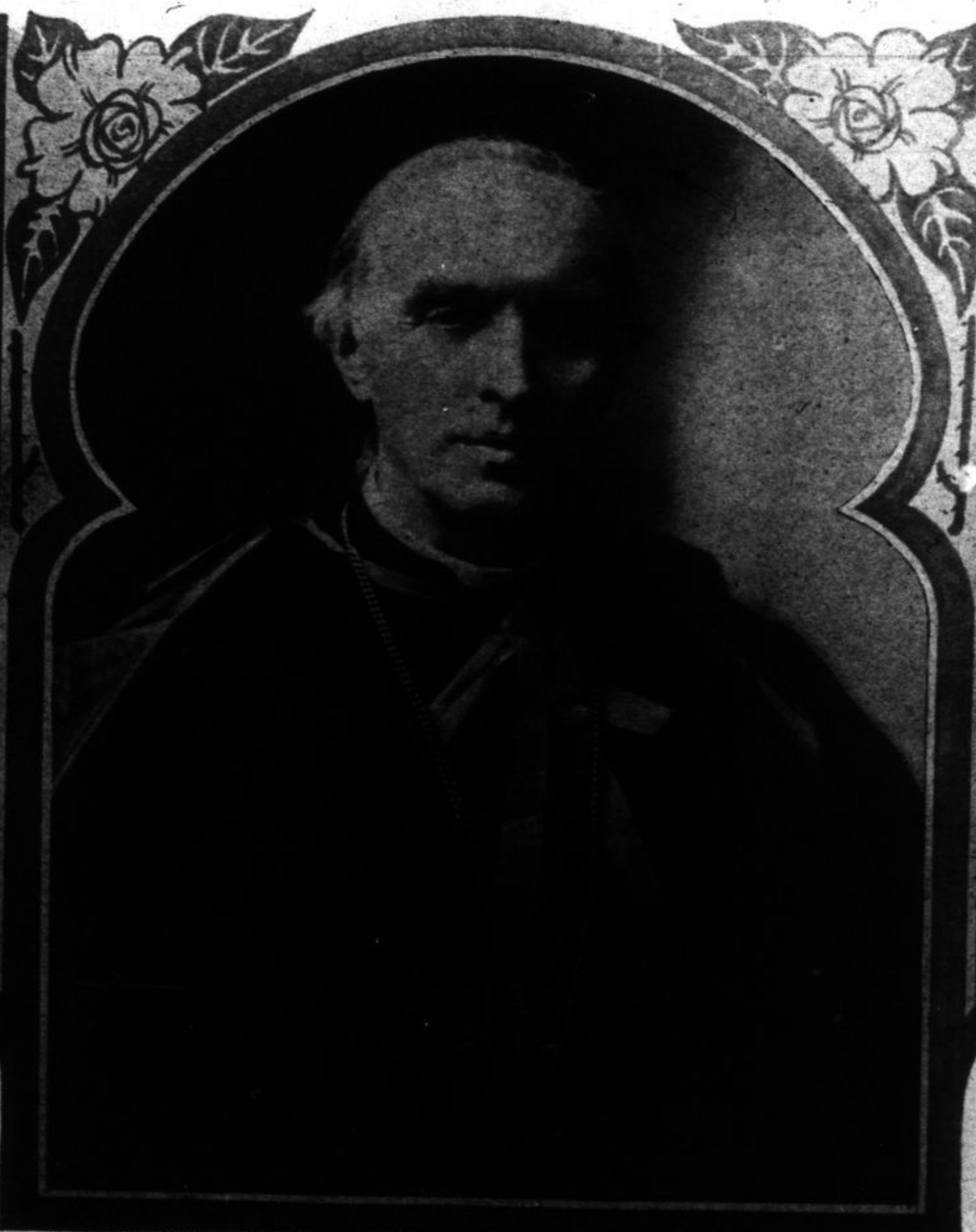
Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, British Ambassador to the United States.
