******* FIGHTING AT CHENG-TU

Consuls Arrange Armistice.

Cheng-Tu, China, April 24 --Fierce fighting has broken out in the streets here between the Sze-Thuen and Yunnan troops, the climax of friction which has steadily increased since the Yunnanese forces entered Chang-Tu last April, Many houses were burned and trenches and barricades were constructed by both parties. The British, French and Japanese, Consuls arranged an armistice. All the foreigners are safe so far. The city is the capital of Sze-Chuen, has 800,000 population, and is the seat of eight American and British missions.
