- Lot No. 1—Consisting of— Serge jackets, Trench coats, Greatcoats and cloaks, Cloth breeches, etc.
- Lot No. 2—Knitted goods—consisting of— Underwear, Socks, Knitted caps.
- Lot No. 3—Consisting of— Denim trousers, Trench trousers, Top shirts, Towels.
- Lot No. 4—Leather—Ankle boots—Repairable—consisting of Boots condemned as unfit for military use.
- Lot No. 5—Leather, Scrap, consisting of— Ankle boots, Canvas shoes, condemned as unrepairable.
- Lot No. 6—Leather, consisting of— Overshoes, scrap.
- Rubbers, scrap.

Ottawa Glimpses

Ottawa, May 5.—Sir Thomas delivered an amazingly short budget speech, so short that the Green Chamber could hardly believe it was over.

The more the Finance Minister's proposals are probed the clearer it is that the addition to the business war tax is as sounding brass and tinkling cymbals.

If, as Chairman Flavell of the Imperial Munitions Board claims, they have now got the profit of the munition makers down to a normal basis—and there is no justification for the Imperial Munitions Board and the War Purchasing Commission is they haven't—then ten per cent ought to be as much as any profiteer is dragging down right now.

Opposition criticism does not overlook the fact either that a war tax on excess profits in the third year of the war is a tacit admission by the government that abnormal profits were in existence and that the government did not have the brains or the courage to prevent such a state of affairs developing.

The fact that Sir Thomas' budget makes another pass at the profiteers and avoids any tax changes that might heap more taxes on already overburdened people, would seem to indicate a general election in the near future.

One supposes that it was for Canada's sake that he warned all Finance Ministers to shun income taxes which might get at the big fellows.

A. K. Maclean made a strong point when he insisted that the war had been badly financed. He wanted more pay-as-you-go, even if it meant additional taxation, and less borrowing.

W. Flavell that the Imperial Government had placed \$50,000,000 worth of war orders in this country. If Canada had nationalized the business of making munitions at the beginning of the war, fully half of this immense sum, say \$25,000,000 could have been saved from the profiteers to go toward decreasing our national debt.

He had the good grace however—Sir Thomas is a clear thinker when in private circulation—to apologize for quoting swollen figures, due to the inflated prices which will not come again until another Armageddon bursts on a stricken world.

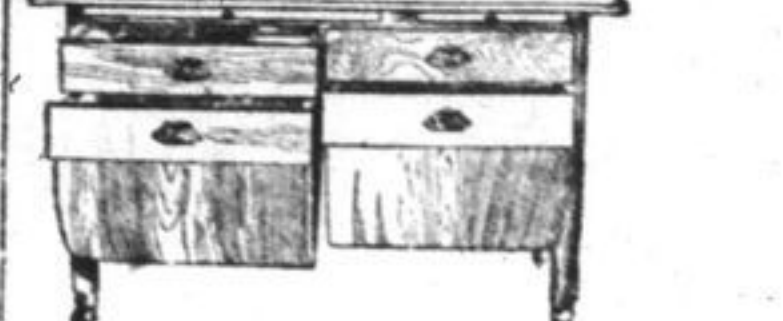
