It is said that cheese buyers have reached the conclusion that 22 1/2 cents might be the basis for the season, but such a price would not be acceptable to the producers some of whom consider that in view of the high cost of feed a price of 27 1/2 cents would be necessary to relieve the farmers.

Buyers in Montreal have suggested 22 1/2 cents.
One vendor says 25 cents is not too much when all the aspects of the milk situation are considered, including the high freight, and insurance rates on cheese shipments.
