Late Lieut.-Col. Britton Wrote Home Shortly Before His Death.

On Wednesday last C. E. Britton, Gananoque, received a letter from his son, Lieut.-Col. Russell H. Britton, who was killed in action in France on May 2nd. The letter was dated April 19th, just two weeks before his death . Speaking of the battle at Vimy Ridge he said:
