DOG SAVED THE SAILORS

ANIMAL AWAKENED CAPTAIN LAWRENCE OF CONGER COAL

At Fairhaven When Vessel Was Afire - The Captain Without Money to Pay Off the Crew.

Fair Haven, N.Y., May 14.—While rumors are current of German plots in connection with the burning of the steamer Porter and Conger Coal early Friday they are not seriously considered here, and it is generally thought that the fire started from the boilers of the Porter.

A dog on the Conger Coal may have been the means of saving several lives, as some of the crew declared that it was the barking of this little mascot that awakened Captain Lawrence, of Kingston, Ont., the ship's master, and other members of the crew.

The cook on the Porter, an older woman, a French-Canadian, who spoke broken English, was in a sudden plight. She was taken to a house where temporary clothing was provided and the ship's master went to the village to buy her clothes.

USE ROLLER FLOUR URGES BIG MILLION Bushels Wheat a Year, He Says.

FAKERS IN GERMANY.

Sold Strange Goods to Replace Table Essentials.

The exhibition of food substitutes in Berlin revealed to the German authorities the existence of a multitude of objectionable articles that were being sold to the people to replace the essentials of life, of which the supplies are steadily waning.

Remarkable facts were contained in the official report of Dr. Fendler, head of the Berlin Municipal Medical Council, which is published in the Vossische Zeitung. It says: "Since the beginning of the war the substitutes for food has increased in the most uncomfortable manner."

"Their factory often consists of a cooking pot, their capital a few marks and some very questionable recipes. One of the principal items to which these manufacturers turned their attention was soup tablets. They called them 'extract tablets,' and they are most pernicious things."

"Another weird mixture is known as 'beef soup.' It is in the shape of a powder and is carefully done up in pretty little cardboard packets. Analysis shows it contains wheat flour, salt, some sticky substance, and a slight pinch of meat extract."

"Equally unsatisfactory is the result of an analysis of a substance sold under the fascinating name of 'citizen's soup pot.' It fetches a high price and is mostly powdered bran with a little meat flavoring. The cost price, including the can in which it is tastefully packed, is about four cents."

"Another field in which there is swindling on a gigantic scale is the fabrication of pudding powder. Here the main ingredient is potato meal. There are lemon, almond, and raspberry puddings, all made of potato meal with a little coloring. Neither taste nor odor of lemons, almonds, or raspberry can be traced. Little bags of this stuff are sold at 10 cents each, containing an ounce or two of meal and a fraction of an ounce of a substitute for milk extract."

"In this way also cream powder, lemon cream, and other delicacies are manufactured. Sometimes maize flour is mixed with the potato flour, but in these cases up go the prices from 50 to 100 per cent. The materials used cost about a cent a pound. In the shape of 'cream' or 'pudding' about 75 is received for them. Finally, there is a pepper substitute; an extraordinary mixture made of worthless substances."

Heads in Possession. "Under present conditions both in Belgium and in France, everything that the officers and soldiers get from the natives and soldiers of such things as are officially commandeered are paid for not only in cash, but in the national coinage. And the prices are fixed by the shopkeepers themselves. The German money is not permitted to be used, in order to avoid contact with the enemy."

Big Estate at Auction. The London estates of Lord Arlington are to be sold by auction in April next. They now produce about \$250,000 yearly from ground rents, with great increases to come as the first reversion falls in five years.

NO FREE HAND FOR JAPAN Has No Treaty With Britain Covering Siberia If Russia Quits. London, May 15.—In reply to a question in the House of Commons Chancellor Bonar Law said no treaty had ever been contemplated with Japan under which that nation would over-run Siberia if Russia relaxed her efforts in the war.

The thousands of spectators who have sat spell-bound before certain scenes of "A Daughter of the Gods" during its crowded run in New York City, have wondered whether Annette Kellermann in the title role of William Fox's picture beautiful was not in actual peril of being dashed against the jagged rocks, as she sought to make a landing from the thundering sea, while bound hand and foot. There is no camera trickery in these thrilling scenes. They were actual as the reality could make them, and on several occasions the star of the million dollar picture was taken unconscious from the surf. A first aid crew, with a regular hospital outfit, accompanied her and during all of these dangerous demonstrations. In swimming the real motive power is derived from the outward kick of the legs, the arms merely serving to keep afloat the upper portion of the body. A mermaid having her lower limbs immovably encased in a tall appendage of glistening scales is deprived of the propulsion so essential to a swimmer; and only by long and continued practice can this difficulty be overcome. But a swimmer thus encumbered in a heavy surf, add unusual skill and strength are required to escape being overwhelmed. Before the picture was completed all bore badges of courage in a way of cruel scars. "It will amaze outsiders, but does not amaze those who were privileged to watch this picture in the making, to know that not one of those scores of swimming girls who are mermaids in the picture escaped either injuries or scars," says Mr. Fox. Normal Graduate Dead. Watertown, N.Y., May 15.—Miss Almira Sykes, aged eighty-two years, whose father was the founder of the First Presbyterian Church in this city, died Thursday night.
