At a meeting of the civic garbage committee on Thursday afternoon it was decided to grant the request of the Poultry Association for permission to collect the bread scraps from hotels, restaurants and boarding houses in the interests of the Greater Production movement.

The committee also decided to increase the wages of the collectors. Assistants will receive 20 instead of 18 cents an hour; single horse drivers 33 cents instead of 30 cents and the team driver 50 instead of 45 cents an hour.

The roof of the incinerator stack house will be sheeted at a cost of not more than \$25.
