IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Movements of Vessels Reported Along the Harbor.

The schooner St. Louis arrived from Oswego with 200 tons of coal. It is understood that the steamer's Aletha and Brockville will be taken to Hamilton to be used in the ferry service there.

The steamer Jex cleared Thursday night for Oswego.

M.T. Co's. bulletin—The tug Emerson arrived from Montreal with two light barges, and cleared with three grain barges for Montreal; the steamer Westerman cleared for Port Colborne to load grain; the steamer Simla with the barge Melrose arrived from Port Colborne with grain. The steam barge Pallette Winter cleared for Ashtabula to load coal for Quebec. Capt. Mahoney, Kingston, is in command. The Pallette is expected to arrive between Murray Bay, Quebec, and Ogdensburg with pulpwood this season.
