NATIONWIDE PROHIBITION COULD NOT LEAVE CANADA

AS A WAR MEASURE IS VERY URGENTLY NEEDED

According to F. W. Duggan of Toronto who spoke in Sydenham Street Methodist Church on Sunday Evening.

The immediate need of nationwide prohibition as a war measure was emphasized by Frank W. Duggan of Toronto in Sydenham Street Methodist church on Sunday evening. "Local prohibitory laws," he said, "have closed thousands of bar-rooms throughout Canada and called forth organized public sentiment so great that a demand is now made for complete prohibition." Here in Ontario we see the logic of this. With the passing of bars, shops and club came decreased drunkenness and increased economy. Those places remote from the Quebec and American borders are deriving greater benefits than those municipalities which are contiguous. For instance—Hamilton, Kingston, London and Toronto there has been a reduction of 2,560 arrests for drunkenness in three months as compared with the same three months under licenses. In Ottawa because of its nearness to the licensed city of Hull, and in Sarnia and Windsor which are opposite the American border the decrease is much less while in Sault Ste. Marie and Niagara Falls there is an increase of 80 and 293 respectively. The improvement here said Mr. Duggan, can only come through Federal action.

Prior to the war England depended more on Russia, Rumania and Bulgaria for grain than upon America. Dire necessity compels these places to hold what they have and England looks to Canada as never before. Within twice as easy reach of England as India or Australia every ton of food grown in Canada is therefore worth two tons grown in India and four tons grown in Australia. For England's sake, that mighty champion of equity and justice, we must stop the breweries and distilleries from destroying our food stuffs.

The Waste

During 1915 distilleries used 83,288,963 lbs. of grain.
 During 1916 distilleries used 44,971,959 lbs. of grain.
 During 1917 distilleries used 88,007,019 lbs. of grain.
 Total, 216,267,947 lbs.
 During 1915 breweries used 145,295,873 lbs. of grain.
 During 1916 breweries used 93,150,690 lbs. of grain.
 During 1917 breweries used 98,552,300 lbs. of grain.
 Total used 336,998,663 lbs.

Allowing 40 bushel to the acre and 50 lbs. to the bushel for different grains we find it required a yearly acreage of 36,044 acres to supply distilleries and 55,832 acres to supply the breweries. It is true the distilleries are providing the Imperial Munitions Board with great quantities of alcohol monthly for war purposes. It is just as true that millions of pounds of food are being destroyed by turning the grain into intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes.

Domination wide prohibition of the manufacture of intoxicants for beverage purposes, prohibition of the inter-provincial sale, and manufacture would save this gigantic waste and assure our own and Allied nations of food sufficient to feed their hungry multitude. It may be added the speaker said, that the farmers of Canada will defy the war. Let the Federal Government act now.

Confirmation Service.

There was a large congregation in St. Paul's Church on Sunday evening, when a confirmation service was held by the Bishop of Kingston. Canon Fitzgerald presented twenty-one candidates. This was the second confirmation service within the past six months and making a total of forty-two confirmed during that time, and a grand total of 300 during Canon Fitzgerald's term in the parish. One of the candidates was from the parish of Coe Hill, all the others confirmed were from St. Paul's church. The bishop gave a very earnest address from the words "I have fought a good fight."

FELT IT WAS HIS DUTY TO SERVE IN WAR

James Harold Talbot Said There Was Something Greater Than a College Degree—Impressive Memorial Service at Cooke's Church.

At Cooke's church on Sunday morning, Rev. E. R. McLean held an impressive memorial service for the late Prof. A. Laird, at one time pastor of the church, Percy Calvert Caverhill, Edward Fair Corkhill, James Harold Talbot, and Garfield Redmond Rodgers. Messrs. Caverhill, Corkhill, Talbot and Rodgers paid the supreme sacrifice.

Mr. McLean made a timely reference to all. He spoke from the text, Hebrew, XII, 1: "Wherefore, seeing we are also compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us."

The speaker made an interesting reference to the late Mr. Talbot. His early home was in Buffalo, and he had planned to return to the States to complete his education, and to take up his life's work. Deceased was going into law, but had carried on most successful work on mission fields, for the Presbyterian church. Mr. Talbot explained his presence back here last fall with this remark: "I could not get away from Canada, I found that in these days there was much more interesting in Canada than in the States."

Mr. McLean made special reference to this remark, and referred to the many who had crossed the line, in order to shirk their duty, stating that the country was well rid of them. He remarked that many a man in Talbot's place, would have made his American upbringing, an excuse but not so with the deceased, who showed such an heroic spirit. Deceased told the speaker that he was very anxious to proceed with his college work, but he felt there was something far more important in these days than a college degree.

Mr. McLean had an interesting letter some time ago from Mr. Rodgers and he read some passages of it, showing that he was very willing to make the sacrifice.

During the service, the choir sang, "One Sweetly Solemn Thought."
