**HERE'S SOMETHING NEW HONORED EMPIRE DAY INCIDENTS OF THE DAY**

**NOT ONE DRUNK IN POLICE COURT AFTER HOLIDAY.**  
Seven Citizens Fined For Speeding Their Automobiles on Down-town Streets—Lives of Citizens Must be Protected.  
The holiday was a pretty wet day, so far as the weather was concerned, but in police court circles it was strictly "dry," as the court calendar showed on the morning after the 24th, not one case of drunkenness was on the list.

As the result of the work of the constable with his little timepiece, a regular jewel in this part of the police business, seven citizens, some very prominent citizens at that, who should have known better, were fined \$5 and costs for their "joy-ride." The speed in the city is fifteen miles, but some went nineteen and twenty miles and even faster.

It was charged that the driver violated the by-law by passing a car at a corner. However, the evidence of the prosecution was not strong enough to convict, and the driver of the ice cart went free.

Invalided From France After Long Period in Trenches.  
Lieut. Frederick Ingledew arrived in the city on Thursday evening from the front, having been returned from the front as medically unfit for the strenuous work there.  
Lieut. Ingledew was formerly a guard at the penitentiary, but qualifying as an officer at Barrielfield he was appointed as an officer of the 10th Battalion at Lindsay under Lieut. Col. J. J. H. Fes. His shooting ability brought him in the honor of being machine gun officer, and recruiting almost all of his section in this district he went to England and to France. After a long time on the firing line he was invalided to England with a slight attack of meningitis, but his recovery from that dread disease left him too weak for the work in France. He hopes to return overseas later.
