TO ORGANIZE A WORLD UNION

To Consider Means to End War and Eliminate Imperialism.

JULY 8TH IS DAY CHOSEN

FOR THE RUSSIAN-CALLED PEACE CONFERENCE.

Russian Congress Decides That It Would Not Be Annexation, But Justice to Restore Alsace-Lorraine to France.

(By United Press.) Petrograd, June 5.—The Workmen's and Soldiers' Council today named July 8th as the date for the Russian-called Stockholm peace conference. The formal call for the international meeting summarizes its purpose "to organize a world union to consider means to end the war and eliminate imperialism."

News that the American Government had refused passports to Socialist delegates to a Stockholm conference caused great disappointment here. President Tschaidze of the Soldiers' and Workmen's Council declared he was "disillusioned" by the refusal.

Labor troubles are increasing here. To-day a general strike was ordered in all Petrograd factories because of a six-hour day and equal wages to men and women. Demands of miners for a 200 per cent. increase in wages were made public to-day. The miners received a 90 per cent. increase, granted by the Department of Commerce in March.

Would Be Only "Justice." Petrograd, June 5.—Restoration of Alsace-Lorraine to France is not an "annexation" by France, but "justice," according to a resolution adopted by the congress of delegates from the front to-day. Such a return, the resolution explained, did not run contrary to the Russian peace platform of "no annexations and no indemnities."

MILITARY CIRCLES.

Lieut. James O'Reilly, son of Judge O'Reilly, Cornwall has been mentioned in despatches. Lieut. O'Reilly is a graduate of the Royal Military College, and enlisted with the Army Service Corps, being transferred to the Field Artillery in France. He has been at the front since March, 1915.

The past week has been one of considerable activity at Petewawa camp. Trains loaded with troops, horses and guns arrived daily and there are now about 2,000 men in camp. It is expected that there will shortly be about 6,000 men in training there. Lieut.-Col. Leslie, Kingston, is officer commanding this year, and Lieut.-Col. Roy, observing in England and at the front will shortly return home to resume his duties as camp instructor.

Sixteen recruits are now at Tete de Pont Barracks to be prepared for Petawawa Camp. One came from Sherbrooke, three from Toronto and the remainder from Montreal.

A refresher course for officers started on Tuesday morning at the Infantry School, Barrieffield.

The Distinguished Service Order has been conferred on Lieut.-Col. G. T. Hamilton, Lieut.-Col. H. G. Reid and Capt. W. S. Tyrnell, graduates of the Royal Military College.

Major-General R. C. Unacke, belonging to a noted Canadian soldier family, and a Royal Military College graduate, was gazetted for a Russian decoration, Order of Saint Anne, First Class, with Swords.

Cadet Keith Davidson, of the Royal Military College, son of the late Controller James Davidson, Ottawa, has accepted a commission with the Royal Flying Corps.

Lieut. McKay McKie, the younger son of Mrs. Robert McKie, Ottawa, and formerly of Kingston, has joined the Engineers and has left for St. John's, Que.

"C" Battery, Royal Canadian Horse Artillery is reaping the benefit of the recent impetus given to recruiting, due to the probability of selective conscription will likely come into effect in the near future. This well-known unit is securing some splendid men in Toronto and vicinity, besides receiving numerous enquiries from distant outside points in United States and Canada. The Toronto depot of "C" Battery is now forwarding drafts of recruits every few days to headquarters at Kingston. After reporting and receiving uniform and full equipment men are then forwarded in drafts semi-weekly to the unit's training quarters at Petawawa.

War badges for men who have served in the Canadian Expeditionary Force at home or abroad, and for those men who have been discharged as medical unfit for service, have been authorized.

Two weeks' supply for the Hospital arrived in the city on Monday. There is no hope yet of the hospital being opened before a month's time but workmen are rushing the work as much as possible.

Capt. Frink, 21st Battalion, was at headquarters on Tuesday morning. The captain left France several months ago on sick leave, suffering from shell shock. Though far from well he is doing nicely. Capt. Frink returned to his home in Napanee on Tuesday afternoon.

L. F. Russell, an Ottawa civil servant, and H. J. Bradshaw, also of Ottawa, have signed up for overseas service with the Army Medical Corps.

Capt. J. A. Bleazard has returned to duty here with the A.M.C., after being at the Quebec Discharge Depot for some time.

Rev. J. W. McNelly, Gonderham, who enlisted with the 252nd, transferred to the A.M.C. Depot on Tuesday for overseas service.

Evidently the Y.M.C.A. do not consider Barrieffield camp worth much to its work this year as no tent is being erected. There are few men in training.

Among the officers at the camp to attend the refresher course at the Infantry School are Major Weller and Major Jarvis, late 254th and Capt. Potts and Watson, late 252nd.
