MILITARY CIRCLES.

INFANTRY ONLY IS TAKING RECRUITS.

It was announced at headquarters on Saturday morning that all artillery recruiting would cease and that all young men now desiring to sign up must take on with infantry units. This order is believed to be the first of one that will take in all units excepting infantry. There is a demand for railway construction and forestry men, but as the physical standard is lower for these units they will probably be "selected" should conscription carry.

Capt. Whelan, Provost Marshal of Ottawa, was at headquarters on Saturday.

Lieut. T. J. Fleurey has received orders to transfer his thirty-five railway constructionists from Barrieffield to the depot at Ottawa.

The first divine service to be held at Barrieffield camp will be held at 9:30 a.m. Sunday in the area usually used for divine service, in front of camp headquarters. All troops in camp will attend. The service will be conducted by Major G. L. Starr, camp chaplain.

H. W. Snelling, formerly manager of the Bell Telephone Company here, has been appointed a civilian clerk on the sub-staff at camp headquarters.

Lieut. Gordon Mills will be in command of fifty men from the Special Service Company being transferred to the Trenton Muniton Guard.

Capt. W. J. McManus leaves on Sunday for Ottawa on military duty.

The dismissing of unqualified officers from militia units is being held in abeyance until further orders, according to a communication received at headquarters.

JUDGE GALT'S ATTITUDE

Says He Will Welcome Inquiry Into Findings.

Winnipeg, June 9.—"I shall welcome any special inquiry into the findings of the commission that investigated the construction of the Agricultural College buildings," said Justice Galt, when asked if he had anything to say in regard to the action of the Dominion Government in appointing a royal commission to look into the Galt reports. "The whole of the evidence on which the findings were based is available at any time. Beyond that I have no further comment to make," he added.

BAN ON MEE'S BOOK

British Weekly Objects to Canadian Censorship. London, June 9.—British Weekly, the leading non-Conformist paper, calls attention to the fact that the Canadian censor has proscribed a book entitled "Defeat" by Arthur Mee, which is a strong plea for prohibition with a chapter dealing with the Canadian aspect. The British Weekly suggests the subject be raised in Parliament.

Sir George Perley says he knows nothing about the banning of the book in Canada.

TOO MUCH FOR CHURCH

To Consider "French Question"?

Toronto, June 9.—"Is it too much for the Church to consider the French question?" Canon Tucker of London, Ont., asked the Anglican Synod, here. He expressed the opinion that the rank and file of the people of Ontario are ignorant of those in Quebec. If they had knowledge on the matter it would make them a little more sane in settling questions between these people."

OBITUARY

The Late Mrs. Harriet Clute. There passed away at Deseronto, on May 23rd, 1917, at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Wesley Asselstine, one of the oldest and most highly respected residents of the Bay of Quinte district in the person of Mrs. Harriet Clute. She was the last of the ten children of the late John Shibley, of Portland Township, Frontenac, where she was born on the old Shibley homestead over ninety-two years ago. Deceased was twice married, first to William Goldsmith, Harrowsmith, who predeceased her about fifty years, and by whom there was an issue of eight children, six of whom survive. About thirty-five years ago she married the late Richard Clute, Stirling, and they spent sixteen happy years together, when Mr. Clute was called to his reward. Deceased was, from childhood, a member of the Methodist church, and all her life lived a simple, clean, sympathetic Christian life. It can be truly said that Mrs. Clute was, in every sense, one of Nature's gentlewomen, beloved by all who knew her. The remains were interred at Harrowsmith at the side of her first husband.
