Instead of returning home he went to the barn for his night's rest taking one of his chums with him, and on Friday night they were going away for another term of enjoyment when the vigilant policemen arrived on the scene.

Their case came up in the Juvenile Court Saturday morning. The lad who went to Toronto was given a term in the industrial school while the case against the other boy was dismissed.
