Toronto, June 11.—Conscription without qualification and in its fullest measure was plainly the resolve of the vast meeting held in Massey Hall on Saturday evening.

Dr. Clark's Great Speech. Dr. Michael Clark, M.P., of Red Deer, made one of the most popular speeches in Canada for the winning of the war, which is the greatest of all history.

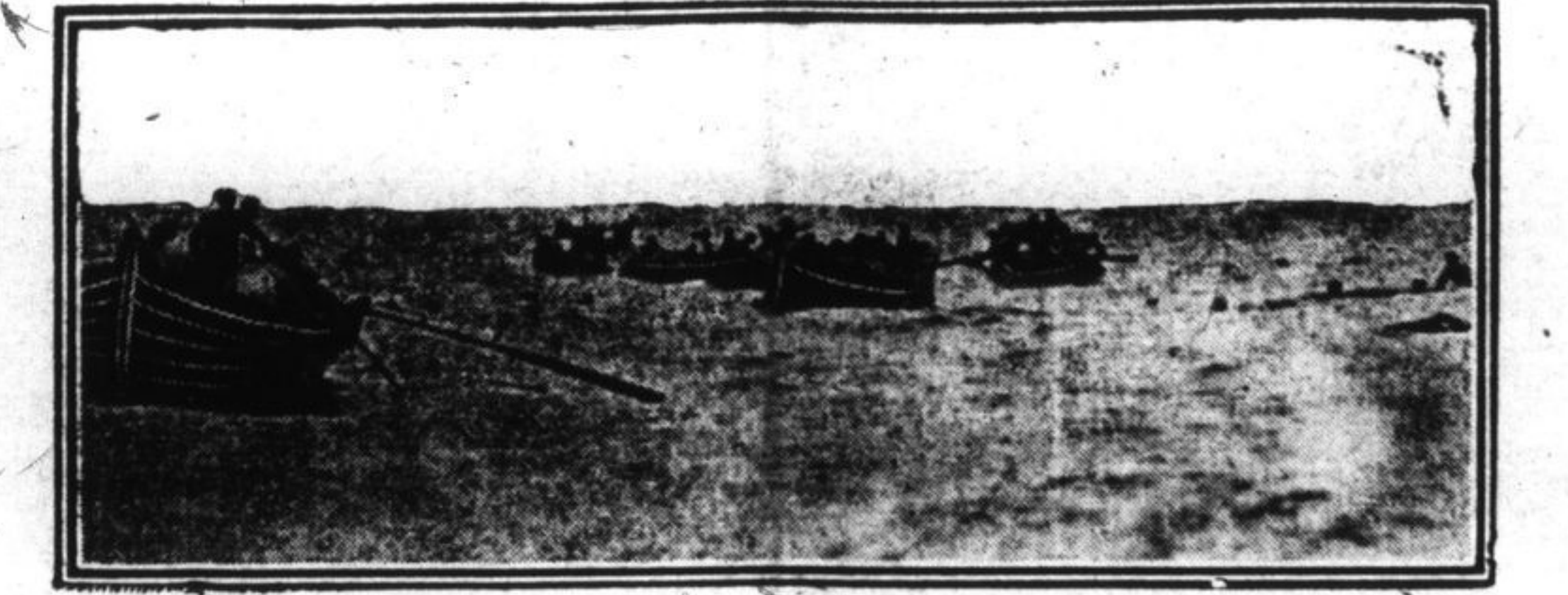

WILL FIX PRICES ON GRAIN OUTPUT

Single Men to be Called in Three Classes Between 20 and 31—All Men Married Since May 18th Are to be Dealt With as Single.
