**THE VOCATIONAL BUILDING AT MOWAT HOSPITAL OPENED ON THURSDAY EVENING**

There was a Large Audience Present—The Building Has the Very Latest in Equipment.

In the splendid new vocational training and recreation building of Mowat Hospital, a large crowd watched with interest the programme put on by the returned soldiers at the formal opening of that building on Thursday evening.

The building is about 100 by 28 feet and it represents the very latest in equipment to answer its purpose. It is ideally located and planned and the official opening was in keeping with it. Mayor Hughes presided and was assisted in the arrangement of the numbers by Capt. J. K. Fairfull, vocational co-ordinator of the institution.

The programme given was very entertaining including numbers by Pte. Wilson, Pte. Segun, Miss R. Campbell, Miss E. Beuker, Pte. Prince, Miss E. Sutherland, Pte. Sutherland, Pte. Creighton, Pte. Butler and Corp. N. McArthur.

At the close of the last number Lieut. P. S. Gales was called on by the men for a few words and he heartily thanked those who had come and by their energy or presence contributed to the success of the evening. He was very grateful to the girls of the Somme Club who made a library possible for the institution and also to them for serving refreshments to the guests and patients.

Capt. Fairfull then brought a really delightful programme to a close, after which refreshments were served.

In the fore-part of the evening many guests were shown through the institution.

**Splendidly Equipped.**

In the new vocational and recreation building there is the finest equipment that probably ever has been put into such a place. The building is about 100 by 28 feet. The lower floor is divided off into an office for Lieut. P. S. Gales, a large class room complete with blackboard and desks, and an immense room in which are fifteen work benches. These benches are similar to those used in the manual training department at Macdonald school, being outfitted with a most complete set of tools. In one corner of this room will be a huge case of special wood-working and other tools and equipment, even down to an electric glue pot.

It is planned to teach art and craft work here which includes copper

beating, wood work of all kinds, etc. Mr. Gould will be in charge. On the second floor of the building is another large room, this one being used for recreation purposes. There is a billiard table, card tables, lounging chairs, etc. On the walls flags are used as decorations. The office of Capt. Fairfull is on this flat. In the class rooms the authorities will give instruction in stenography, bookkeeping, telegraphy, commercial law, civil service qualifications, elementary work and when a fully equipped garage is completed motor mechanics will round out the list. "This is the finest institution of its kind in Ontario," was the remark of a recent inspecting officer.

**ALBERT TREADGOLD STRUCK BY STREET CAR**

He Suffered a Fracture of Right Leg While Crossing Tracks.

While crossing the car tracks at the corner of Union and Frontenac streets about two o'clock on Thursday afternoon on a motorcycle, Albert Treadgold, son of A. E. Treadgold, Frontenac street, was struck by a street car and suffered the fracture of his right leg.

The lad, who is about fifteen years of age, had finished his lunch at his home, and was going down to the good road on Union street before proceeding to his father's sporting goods store on Princess street. With the noise of the motorcycle and the difficulty of seeing an oncoming car at this crossing he did not know of the approach of the car. He had passed over the tracks except for a about four or five inches when the car struck the back wheel of the motorcycle. The lad was thrown off. He was later taken to the General Hospital where his injuries were attended by Dr. G. W. Myka. The X-rays showed that he was suffering from a fracture of the right leg. The motorcycle was not damaged to any appreciable extent, the back wheel being smashed.

**WAS ORDAINED JUST FORTY YEARS AGO**  
**Father Kelly, of Smith's Falls, Celebrated His Solemn Anniversary.**

On Sunday June 17th Rev. Father Kelly, the pastor of St. Francis de Sales church, Smith's Falls, celebrated the fortieth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. He was ordained June 17th, 1877, in his native city of Waterford, Ireland, and remained there for three or four years, and in 1881 came to Canada, coming to Kingston where he held an official position under the late Archbishop Cleary. In 1899 he removed to Smith's Falls succeeding the late Father Stanton and for the intervening eighteen years he has faithfully and acceptably ministered to the people of St. Francis de Sales church. At the morning service solemn high mass was celebrated by Father Kelly with Rev. Father McDonald, Merrickville as deacon and Rev. Father Hanley, rector of the cathedral.

We congratulate him on reaching his fortieth anniversary beloved and esteemed by his co-religionists and equally so regarded by those whose faith is not exactly as his.
