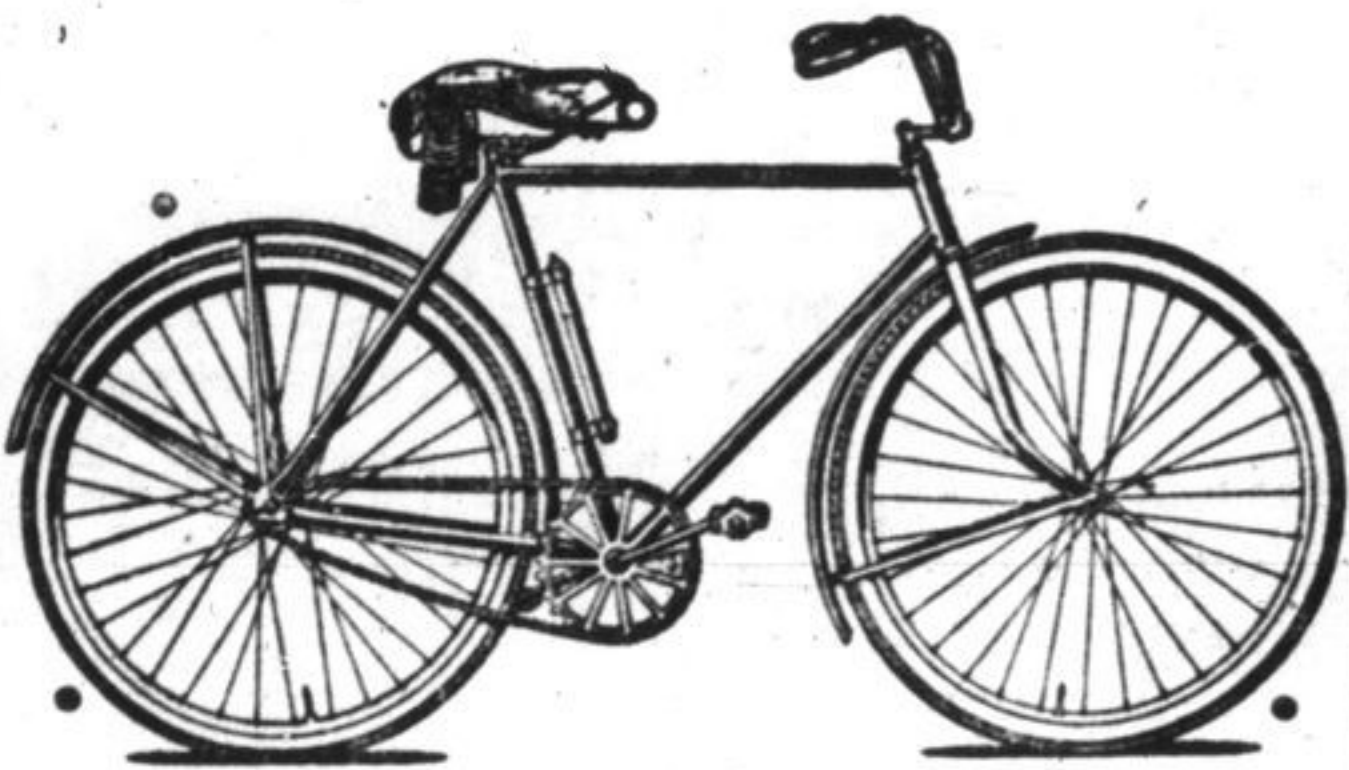


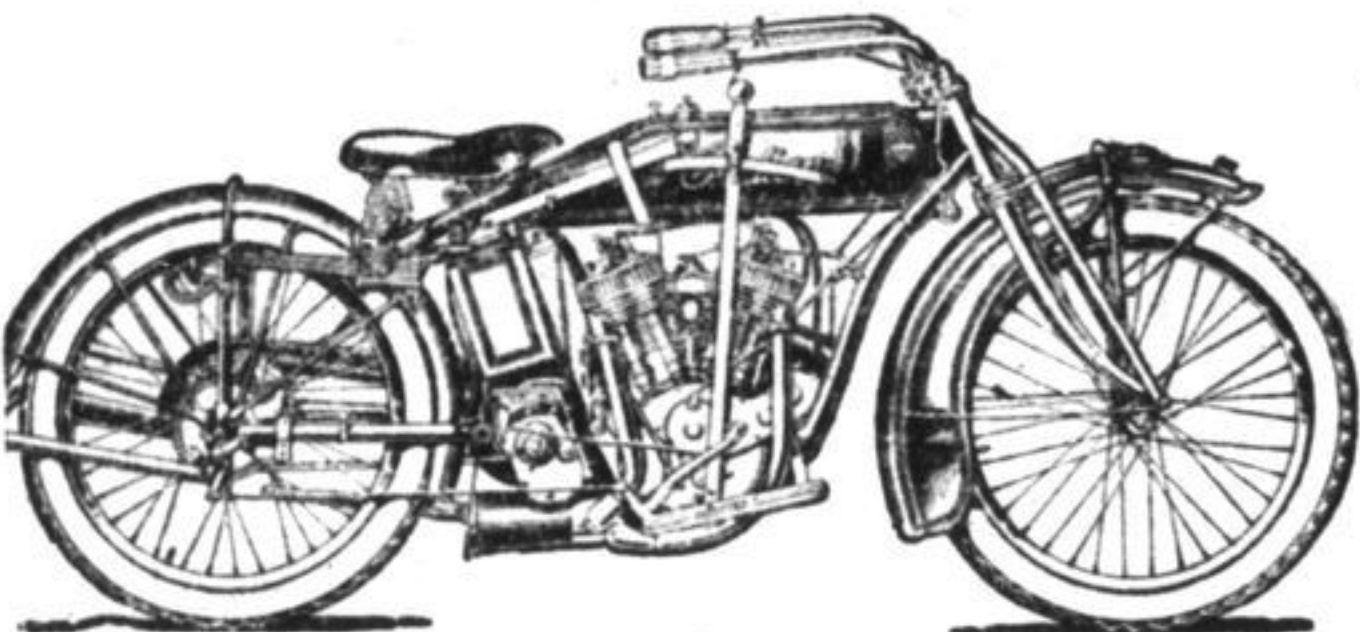

Sporting Notes

The New York American League Club have signed William J. Rafter, outfielder of the Syracuse University team.

Major W. H. Wiley, treasurer of the military committee of the United Engineering Societies of New York, has received a cheque for \$13,114.50, the amount contributed to the First Reserve Engineer Regiment from the baseball game between the Highlanders and St. Louis at New York last Sunday.

Joe Burman, the Chicago bantamweight, and Jack Sharkey, of the New York West Side, furnished an interesting ten-round contest at New York last night. Burman had a slight advantage.

Jack McKelvey, of Hamilton, who was recently declared to be ineligible for amateur competition by the Ontario branch of the C.A.A.U., has accepted a position with the Dominion Steel products Company of Brantford. He will play baseball for the team of that firm. The team is a semi-pro. one.

All national championships will be held this year by the American Amateur Athletic Union in spite of the war and in spite of the decision reached by the conference of amateur sport governing bodies to forego the holding of championship fixtures.

The Detroit Tigers will play the Leafs in Toronto on July 24th, while on August 15th at the Stadium the Tigers and Cubs will stage an exhibition game. On August 29th the Washington Club will be in Toronto to play the Leafs.

Ben Tineup, formerly with Philadelphia and Providence, and now with Little Rock in the Southern Association, pitched a no-hit, no-run game against Birmingham this week. He did not give a base on balls.

The opinion seems to be generally held that the ball teams of both major leagues lack pep this season. No particular reason is given for this condition, but the fact is that the players go through their performance in a most uninspiring manner.

Larry Lajoie has made a shift in his Toronto club. Shortfielder Jimmy Smith has been relegated to the bench, and Lena Blackburne has been shifted from third to Smith's position. It was at shortfield that Blackburne attracted the attention of the White Sox several years ago, when he was given a chance in the American.

To Play for Red Cross. Several promising young recruits, including Charley Comiskey, Adrian Anson and Fred Pfeffer, are expected to be given a tryout in a baseball game which will feature the Red Cross field day, to be held at Weeghman park, Chicago, on July 21st.

The two clubs will be made up mostly of stars of the old National league and old American association. On the former team will be Anson, Pfeffer, Pete O'Brien, Mort Scanlon, Jack McCormick, Frank Sauter, Eddie Hughes, William Geiss, Frank Nichols, Joe Biwell and Bob Sweitzer. In the line-up of the latter will be Comiskey, Tom Dawson, Nat Hudson, Jake Stahl, Tony Mullane, Adolph Spellman, Matty Zimmer, Charley Racing, Jimmy Callahan and George Moriarity.

Postponed Games. Postponed games in the National and American leagues this season have reached a total of 109. The American league leads in this respect with 57. The National league is not far behind, as 52 games have been prevented by ground or weather conditions in this league. The Cubs have been most fortunate in escaping postponements, having only three to date. The Giants and Braves have been idle on eleven days when games were scheduled. In the American league the Yankees have been hit the hardest, rain preventing twelve games to date. The Tigers are close behind with eleven.

Will Box 20 Rounds. After a long squabble over the referee question, Jack Britton has agreed to an official of a Dayton gymnastic club, and will meet Ted Lewis in a 20-round battle to a decision for the welterweight championship here on Monday evening, June 25. The bout will be an open air contest.

BARRY ATTRIBUTES SLUMP TO STALENESS

Leader of World Champions Expects to Win Again —Fears White Sox

When asked to account for the recent slump of his team, Jack Barrie of the Boston Red Sox smiled, and said:

"Oh, just trifling staleness on the part of my pitchers. We have recovered from that little setback, and are going to tear right in from now on, and make the other teams of the league play the best ball of their lives to keep up with the procession. My team as a whole, is in perfect playing shape right now. The boys are hitting and fielding better now than they did at the start of the season, and we are going right out to win another pennant."

"The White Sox look like the team we will have to beat, and we are figuring on passing Roland's bunch within two weeks. As soon as we take the lead there will be nothing to stop us. I know my team pretty well, and I have no hesitancy in saying that it is stronger this year than ever before. That being true, I cannot see any team in our league capable of stopping us, nor do I think there is a team in the National League that we cannot beat in a world series. The Giants, I believe, the team we will have to face in the big series. McGraw has a great aggregation, but I believe the blue ribbon of baseball will remain in possession of the American League for at least another year."
