Peterboro Hero is Now in Kingston to Undergo an Operation on His eye-He Was Wounded Twice and Had Many Narrow Escapes.

Corporal D. J. McIntosh, of Peterboro, has arrived in Kingston, to undergo an operation on his eye, providing it is found that he is strong enough to stand it.

Corporal McIntosh is home from the front. He went overseas with the 73rd Battalion, from Peterboro. and got home on June 5th. He was wounded twice. The first time he was hit was sometime in October. He received a bayonet wound on the chin he wound being so bad as to require fourteen stitches to close. He also had his jaw broken at the same time and twenty-seven pieces of shrapnel In his hip he had seventeen pieces and his hip was also broken. One piece of shrapnel went through his arm on one side and came out the other side, and one piece also went

Corpl. McIntosh was also buried four times. The first time he was uried he was under ground for six nours and forty-three minutes. had his chest broken and bruised and when he was uncovered he was unconscious for over a day, Corpl. McIntosh belonged to the

headquarters staff of the 42nd Highanders and was on his way to the ergeant-major's dug-out for hip boots.
