COUNTY TAX RATE FIXED

FOR THIS YEAR AT SEVEN AND A HALF MILLS.

The Townships of Portland, Kingston and Pittsburg are to pay for the Seed Potatoes Recently Purchased. The County Council on Friday afternoon decided to fix the tax rate for the year at 7 1/2 mills instead of 9 mills as at first proposed by the Finance Committee. To do this it was necessary to carry an overdraft till next year \$12,000 in patriotic grants, for which debentures will then be issued. The rate for 1917 is two mills more than that last year, half the increase being caused by patriotic and charitable grants.

On recommendation of the Finance Committee it was decided to increase the Children's Aid Society grant \$200, owing to the increased work undertaken by that society and the great good being done for the county. It was also decided to pay the jail physician hereafter by fees. At present Dr. I. G. Bogart receives \$200 for jail attendance. The high constable was also made trustee officer, an official much needed in Frontenac county. An increase of \$60 was made to School Inspector Truscott, for expenses.

J. Bushell, manager of the Kingston Industrial Fair, addressed Council and asked for an increased grant, to which he held the fair was entitled, as it was run by Kingston and Pittsburg townships, which paid the bulk of the county taxes. It should therefore get more than the township fairs. Mr. Bushell asked the reeves to look carefully over the prize list and they would see that it had been increased by \$400. Mr. Bushell made a vigorous appeal to the Council to petition the authorities at Ottawa so that he could arrange an excursion to the Experimental Farm at Ottawa for the benefit of the farmers of the district. His request had been refused, but he noticed that cheap rate excursions are being run to the aviation camp at Deseronto. "It is not farmers who go on that kind of excursion," he declared, "but joy-riders and slackers." Mr. Bushell also asked that he be given assistance in having the railway change their decision not to carry live stock after Sept. 1st for less than normal rates. This regulation favored the big Toronto exhibition and hit the small September fairs.

The budget passed gives the Kingston Fair Association a grant of \$100 the same as last year.

These grants were passed on recommendation of the Roads and Bridges committee: Olden \$50; Clarendon and Miller \$50; Barrie \$75; Bedford \$50 rebate for 1916 and \$50 for 1917; Portsmouth breakwater, \$50; Boss Marsh Bridge, Storrington, \$75; Desert Lake Road, Loughboro, \$50; Wolfe Island breakwater, \$50; line road between Pittsburg township and Leeds county, \$50; total \$650.

Councillor McGregor of Barrie objected to his municipality being charged for the keep of a young woman in the House of Refuge. The auditor explained that the young woman had come in from Barrie and could not be left on the street. According to the act Barrie was responsible, but the House of Refuge had also received a card from Reeve Gray and the clerk of that township, agreeing to meet the expense of caring for the young woman.

The treasurer was instructed to bill the township councils of Kingston, Portland, and Pittsburg, each for a carload of potatoes some time ago purchased by the County for seeding purposes. Arrangements have been made whereby these townships pay for the potatoes owing to the fact that the County Council has no legal right to spend money for buying seed potatoes. It is understood the member for Frontenac will see that the three townships are recompensed. This is the way the County Council clears its skirts of the matter, as Dr. Spankie, the Wolfe Island reeve, demanded that the county treasury be reimbursed for the money illegally taken from it to purchase the potatoes. Warden McKnight presided at the closing session of the County Council on Saturday morning, when various by-laws were passed.

The resignation of Dr. I. G. Bogart as jail physician, was received and accepted. Peter M. Ritchie also resigned his position as county high constable. The council adjourned till the third Tuesday in November.

There will also be placed on view each evening two excellent vaudeville acts with some of the leading artists on the stage in the different roles.

The children have not been forgotten as there are a number of new swings and slides and athletic apparatus and the old established merry-go-round, with new musical selections will be on deck. On Wednesday afternoons a vaudeville entertainment will be given for the children with a free entry to the park by the cars.

The park, being newly fitted up, will be a pleasant resort, where everyone can enjoy the cooling breeze from the lake. Prof. Miller will have charge of the musical programme. Mr. Hamer will look after the moving pictures.

DESTRUCTION OF INSECTS

Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Offers Free Advice.

A few days ago the Whig referred to the excellence of a bulletin issued by the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, dealing with the destruction of insects, etc. A large number of enquiries have been made as to the name and number of this circular, and we are pleased to give same. The circular is No. 9, and it is entitled "Common Garden Insects and Their Control," by Arthur Gibson. In a preface to this circular the Department makes the following announcement:

"We shall be pleased to hear from any one whose crops may be troubled with insects not described in this circular and to advise them specially. No postage is required on such letters of inquiry when addressed:

"Dominion Entomologist,
Department of Agriculture,
Ottawa, Ont.
Such inquiries should be accompanied in all cases where it is possible by specimens of the insects. The insects should be sent packed with their food plant in a strong wooden or tin box to prevent loss in transit. Packages up to 12 ounces in weight may be mailed free and every package should bear or contain the sender's name and address and be accompanied by a letter."
