**WOULD LIKE TO BE FREE**  
HE WANTS NO CONSCRIPTS FOR REINFORCEMENTS.

Canadian Soldier of First Contingent Writes Remarkable Letter to Picton Relatives.

A soldier's view of conscription is contained in a letter from Pte. Fred Cowan to a relative, which is published in the Picton Times. He says: "I am sorry to hear that the Prime Minister speaks of conscription, for it is a shame to think they must do such for all the men they will secure and I have heard the news of more than one Canadian on the subject. They are all strong against it and a Government which passes it will be short-lived on our return. It is a disgrace to our fallen comrades to be reinforced by conscripts, and I say right here that strange as it may seem, most of the old country fellows are apparently quite delighted with the outlook, whereas their own country has shown a very poor example. Borden may have done some good in London, but I guess they put a lot of queer notions in his head. Would that I were not in the army so I could write some startling facts.

"How is it that I, a soldier of the original Canadian expeditionary force, cannot get leave to Canada? No, I must spend my time and money among strangers, where an officer can have leave every four months and we soldiers once a year if we are lucky. From what I can gather the longer a fellow endures this country the more they expect. I wonder how many of the men who are making so much noise about conscription will come themselves, or have they a son who is of fighting age. We have no say at all. And all we can do is to bear it until we are free, and then watch out; something will happen that will startle you. The Canadian army has some strange individuals in its ranks, and perhaps as much brains as those with all the say. Do not come to the conclusion that I am disheartened. Far from it I manage as well as the next, but I write under the conditions under which we live."

**PITTSBURG DIVORCE CASE IS DISPUTED.**  
Commons Committee Declines to Accept the Findings of the Senate.

An Ottawa despatch says: The Private Bills Committee of the Commons yesterday asserted its authority in regard to divorce cases, by declining to accept the evidence in connection with a petition, upon which the Senate granted a divorce. The committee believing the case not to be fully established, decided to call for more evidence before passing the bill.

The case was that of Mrs. Florence Kennedy, of Pittsburg, Frontenac county, who is seeking a divorce from her husband. The committee reviews Senate divorce bills, but usually accepts the judgment of the Senate Divorce Committee.

**Special Rates For Fairs.**

Difficulty that has confronted the Central Canada Exhibition Association in securing special railway fares for the exhibition has been overcome. The association has now arranged with the Eastern Canada Passenger Association for a special rate to cover part of Quebec, eastern and central Ontario and points in Vermont.

From Kingston, Prescott, Brockville and adjacent points, there will be single fare on all roads on September 10th and 13th, good for return within three days. There will be a rate of a fare and a half from September 10th to 14th, good to return up to September 19th, on all roads from all stations in Ontario and Quebec east of and including the C.P.R. and C.N.R. Toronto Sudbury lines, and taking in Quebec city and places in Vermont.

The members of the Government interviewed referred the deputation to D'Arcy Scott, of the Dominion Railway Commission, and he gave the promise that the railway companies would be permitted by the commission to place necessary train equipment at the disposal of the fairs.

**OTTAWA SCHOOL MUDDLE**  
Five Christian Brothers Now Involved in Court.

Toronto, June 27.—A motion by the Ottawa Separate School Board to transfer to Ottawa the hearing of the motion to commit Chairman Samuel M. Genest for disobedience to the injunction granted by Justice Lennox on December 17th 1914, restraining the board from employing unqualified teachers was refused by Chief Justice Falconbridge at Osgoode Hall. His Lordship enlarged the motion sine die to be brought up again on two days' notice, as the examination of five Christian brothers is necessary to prove the alleged disobedience to the injunction. The five brothers have refused to answer questions upon examination and the enlargement was to permit of motions to commit the quintette to prison.
