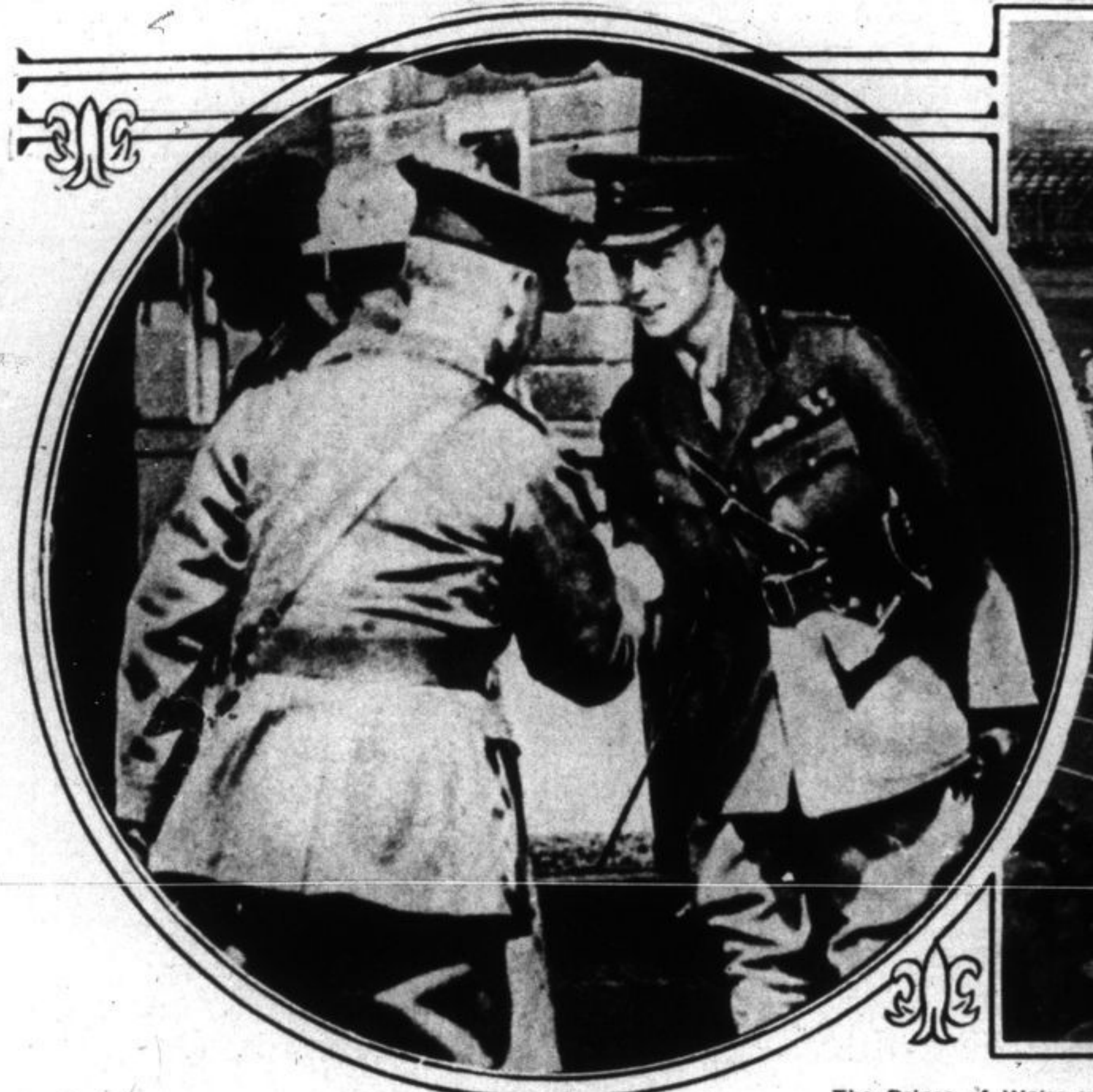
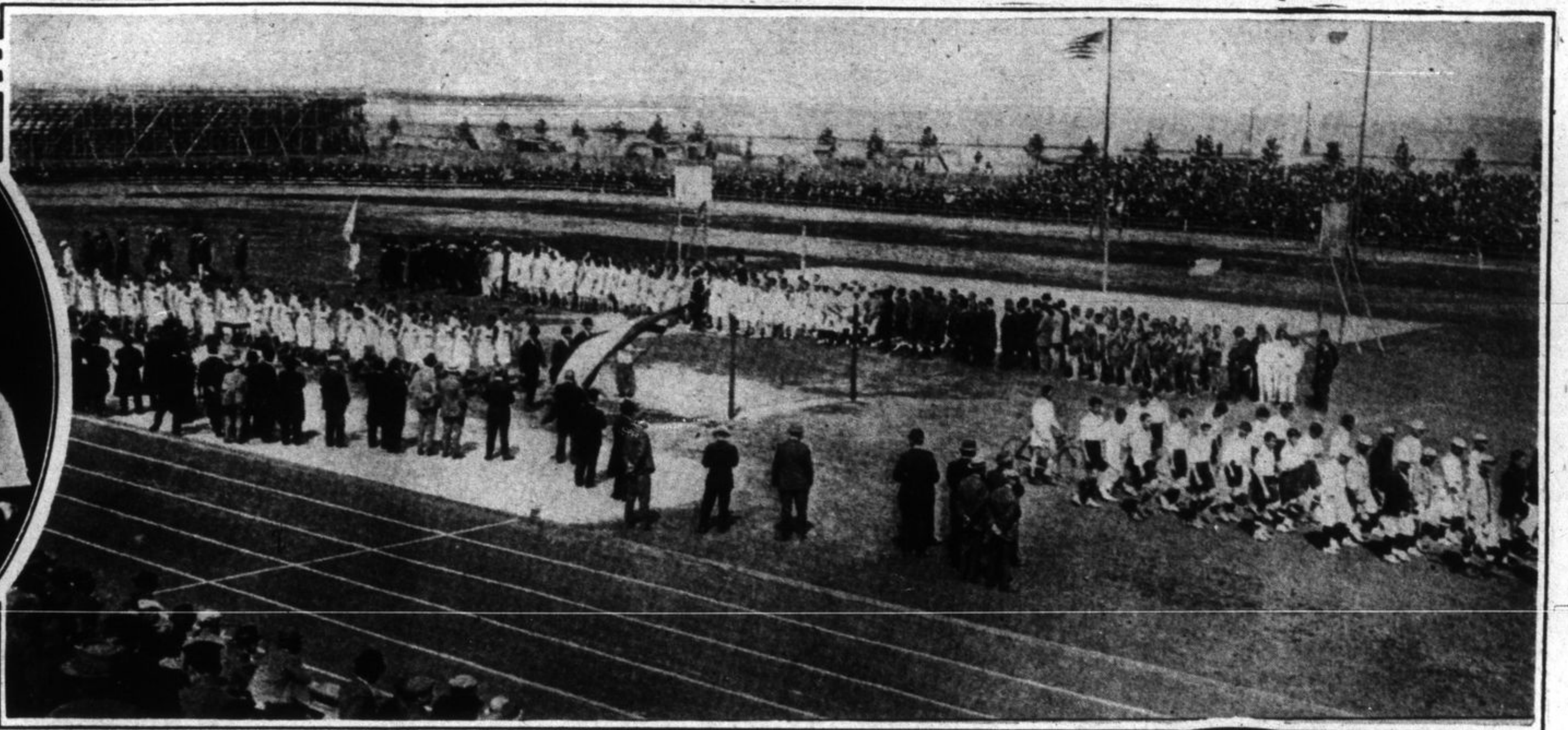

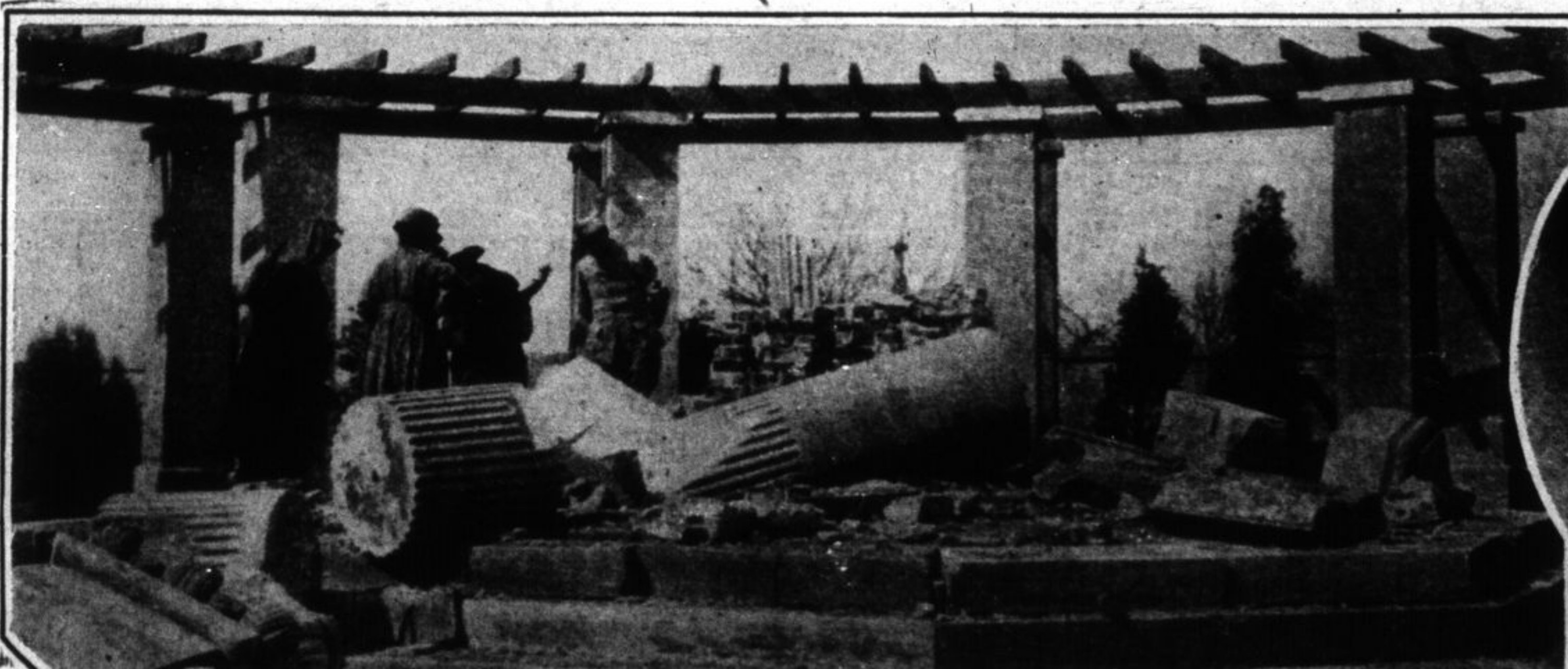
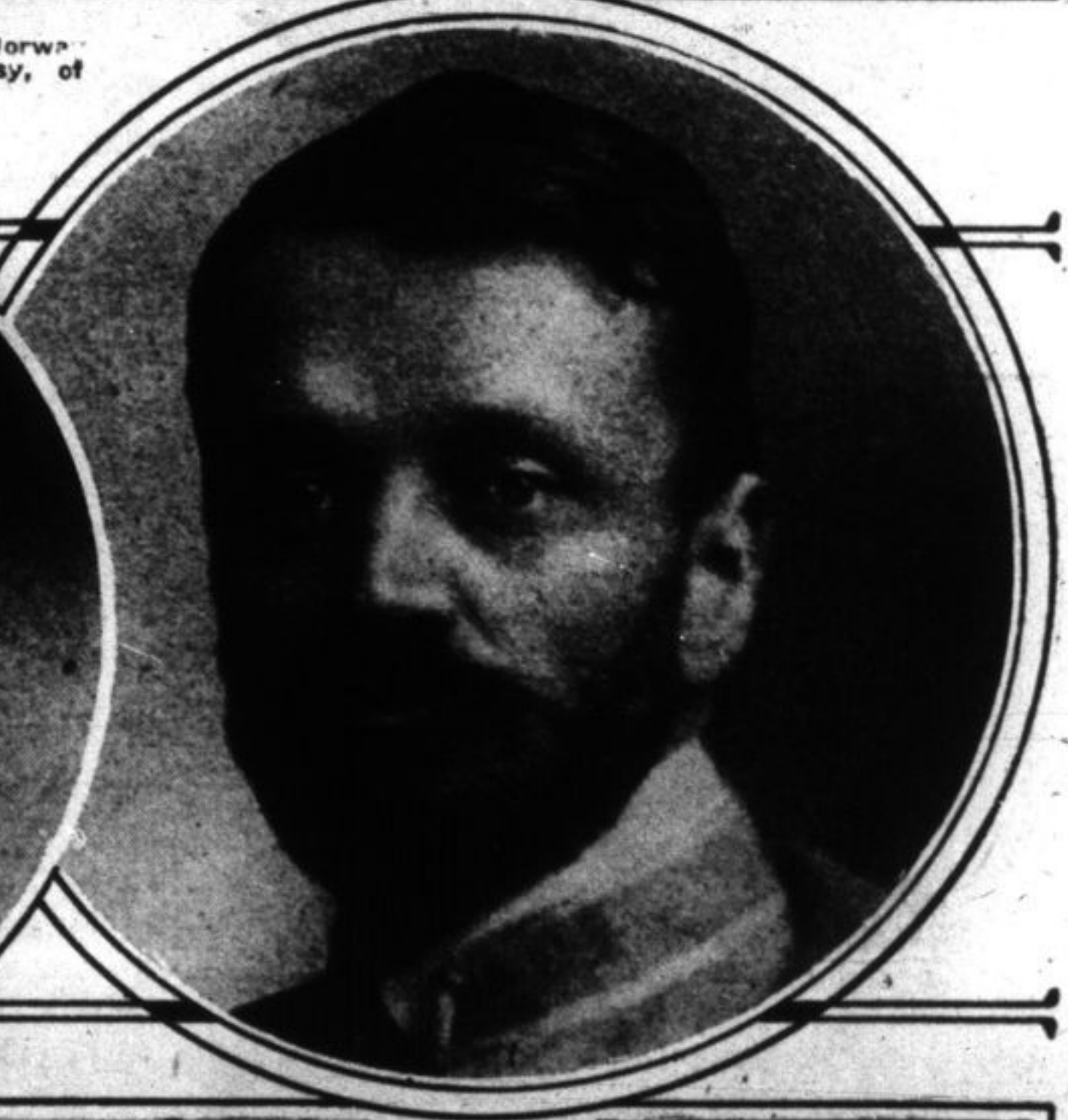
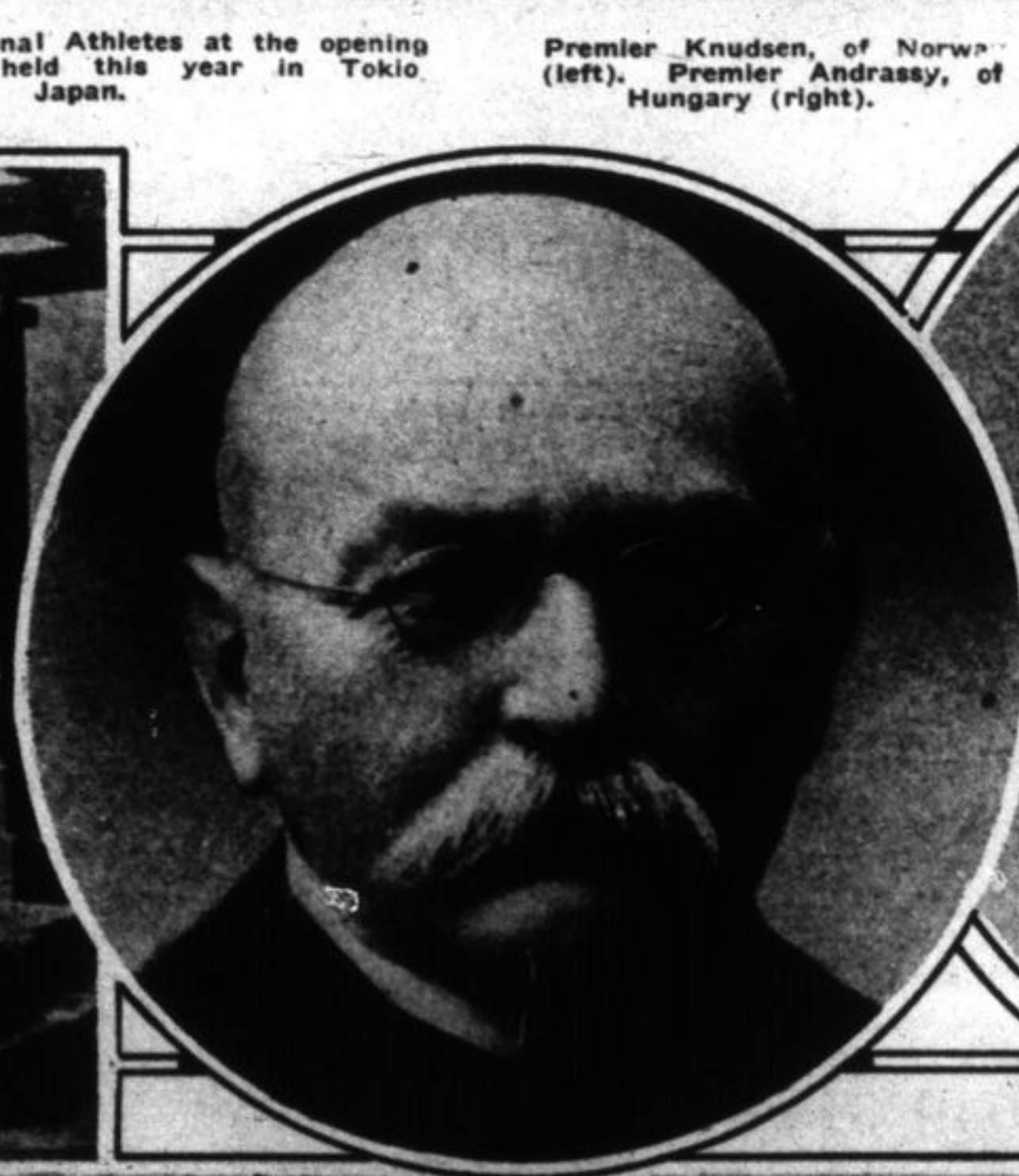


The Prince of Wales welcoming an American Army Surgeon at the threshold of Buckingham Palace.

Premier Knudsen, of Norway (left); Premier Andrássy, of Hungary (right).

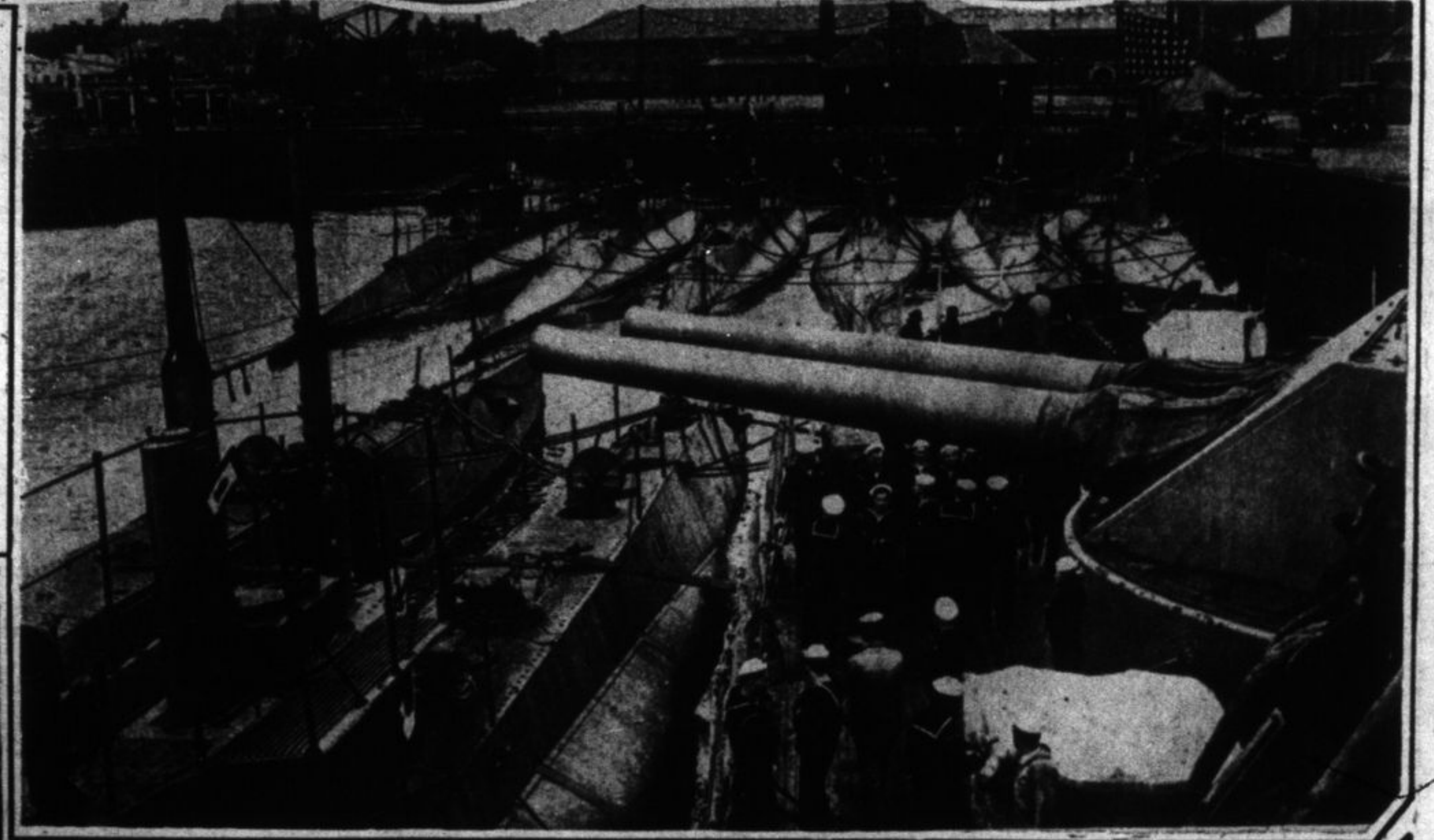

Type of German shelter, built of solid concrete, used by a machine-gun squad. The position of which it formed part was destroyed by the French mines, but despite the force of the explosion the shelter remained intact, though turned upside down. It is fortifications of this kind that give the famous Hindenburg line its so-called impregnable character.
