



SERGT. FRED NEAL,




CORPL. STANLEY BOSWELL, Now in France with a draft from the 146th Battalion.

PTE. ARTHUR BOSWELL, Chauffeur for General Phipps Hormby, in the Imperial Army.




QUEEN STREET METHODIST CHURCH,
