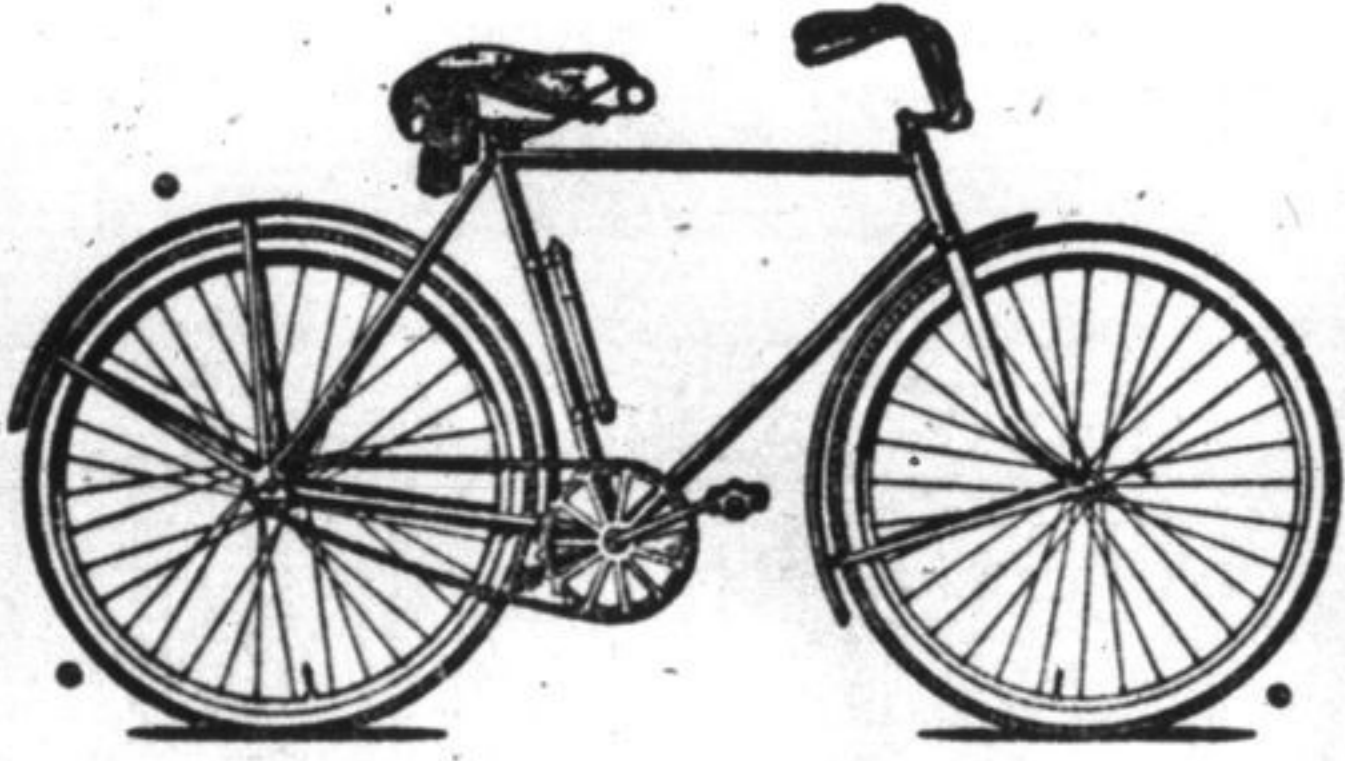


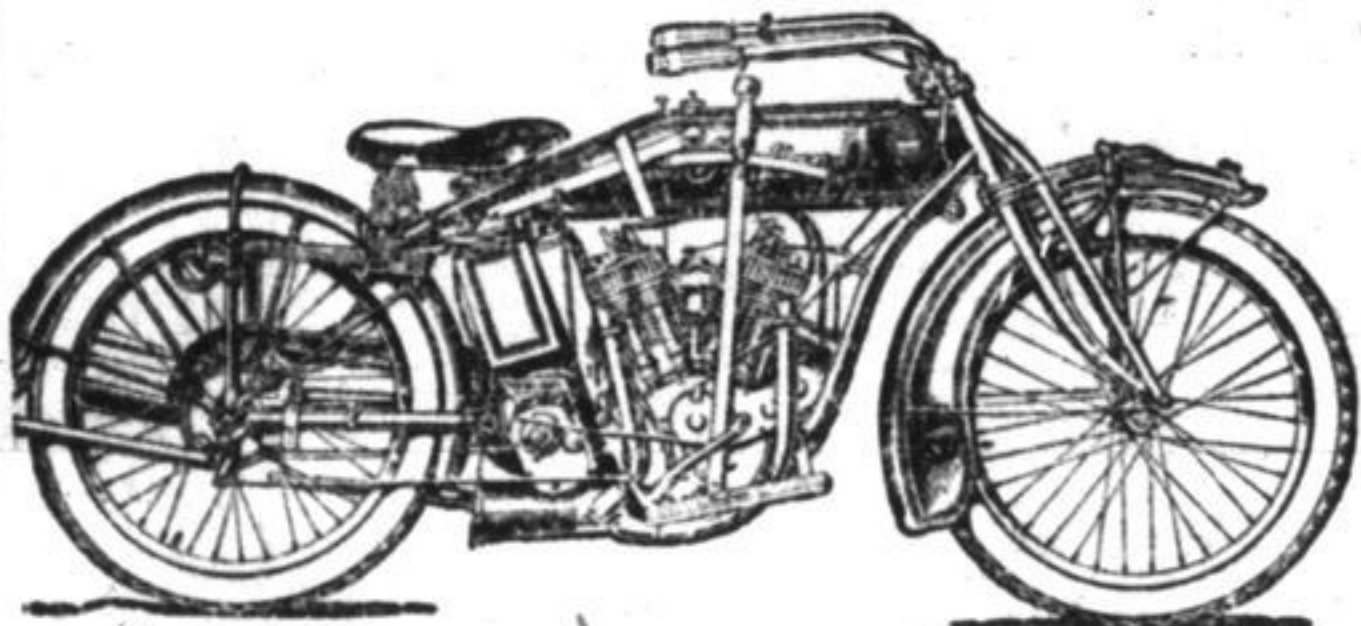

He had been manager of the Syracuse and Rochester clubs in the old Eastern League, and was also at the head of the Boston, St. Louis and Pittsburg National League clubs. At one time he was manager of the Guelph Maple Leafs. That was in 1886.

STATE LEAGUE'S TROUBLES

Utica and Harrisburg Ready to Quit.

Utica's career as a member of the New York State League of professional clubs is about to close. It is reported from very reliable sources. The Utica baseball club, it is said, has decided to throw up the franchise shortly, through John T. Buckley, president of the Utica baseball club, declares that he knows nothing of any decision on the part of the State League to quit as a whole.

It is reported from Syracuse that the Harrisburg franchise will also be abandoned and the members of the Harrisburg team made free agents. The Utica club is behind between \$4,500 and \$5,000 so far, about \$3,000 of this amount having been lost this season and the remainder last season.

New Trotting Record.

Axton, a chestnut stallion owned by Sam Harris, of Aurora, Ill., with Harris up, set a new world's 2:11 trot record for a stallion in a race on a mile dirt track at Lincoln, Neb., covering the distance in the 3rd heat in 2:09 3/4. Axton will go to the Grand Circuit this summer, first appearing at Cleveland, Ohio.

COBB NOW NEARING HIS WORLD'S RECORD

He Has Batted in Thirty-four Successive Games For Hits.

Tyrus Raymond Cobb is in a fair way to shatter all major league batting records of recent years this season as well as to surpass his own mark for consecutive hitting made in 1911, when he scattered eighty hits through forty straight games and brought this season's batting figure up to .410, an average surpassed but once in the American League.

Cobb passed "stuffy" Melnis of the Athletics in the matter of consecutive hitting on June 22nd when he made four in the two games of that day. The Philadelphia mark up to then, a record for the season, was seventeen games.

The present batting streak began on the afternoon of May 31st, when the Georgian got to Caldwell twice for safe hits. In two games, those of June 5th, against Shawkey, of New York and of June 15th against Walter Johnson of Washington, Cobb batted for 1,000, and in three others he has hit for 750. In the present run of 34 games Cobb has batted for the phenomenal high figure of .470.

TRAPSHOOTING A CURE

Half-Holiday Each Week Will Keep Man Fit.

A travelling man, stopping at a Chicago hotel, told of the prescription given to New York business men by Dr. L. R. Weismiller, physical director of a metropolitan Y.M.C.A., in which the doctor ordered the brain-fagged and nerve-wrecked to "beat it" for the country, smoke corn-silk cigarettes and otherwise act like "kids."

A notice posted throughout the association building reads in part: "Forget your dignity, throw away your staidness and be a kid again—a wholesome, fun-loving, lighthearted, dime-novel-reading kid—during your vacation."

To Stop Handbook Men.

Owing to the inability at the time to make cases against these men the matter has been allowed to go on till now, but as a protection to the race tracks which pay high taxes for the privilege of their mutual betting, the Government Detective Department has been instructed to leave no stone unturned to make cases in future and employ all the additional force necessary to see that the law is obeyed.

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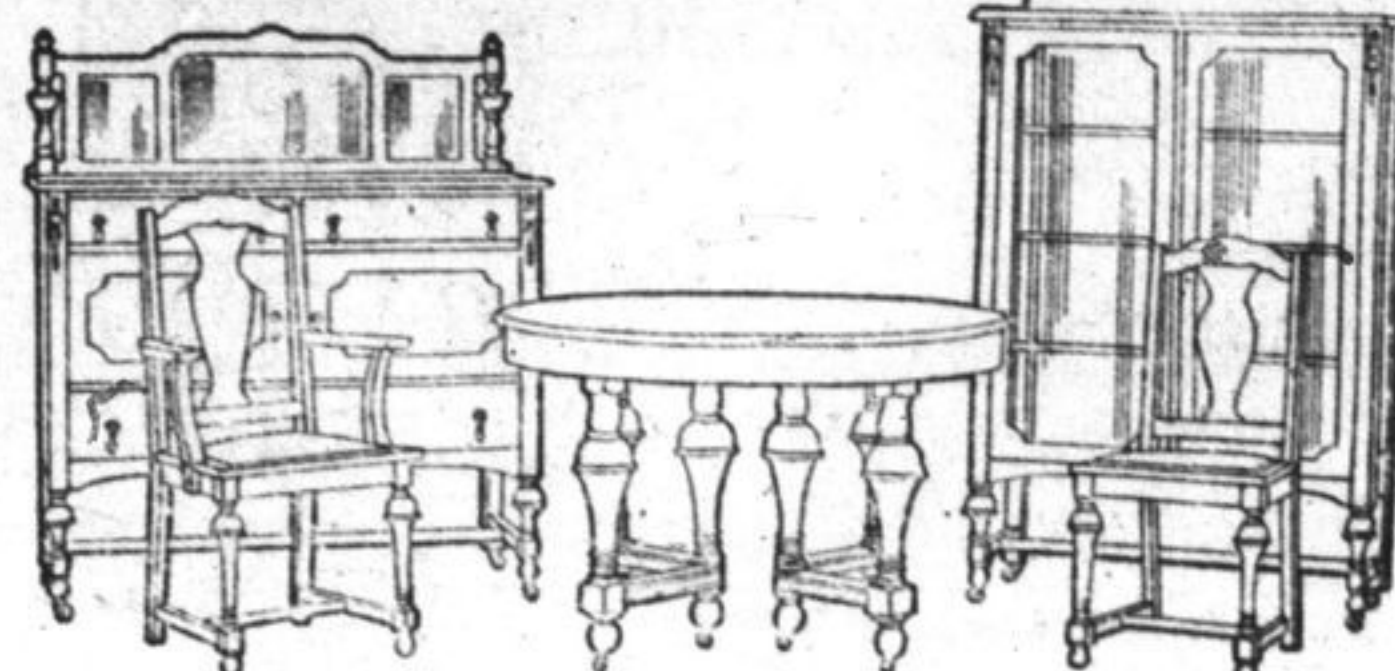

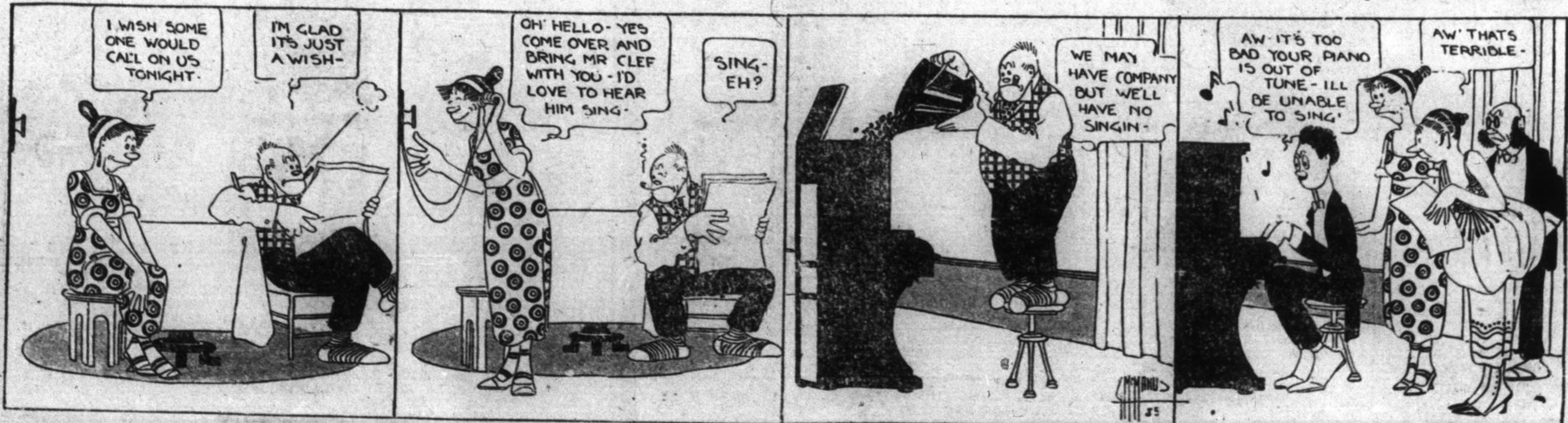
