## KINGSTON MEMBER WRONG

IN SAYING PERMANENT FORCE IS TO BE INCLUDED.

**In the Conscription Regulations—This Force is Part of the C.E.F.—Advice to Mr. Nickle.**

According to the Kingston Standard W. F. Nickle, M.P., has secured from the Solicitor-General a definite statement that members of the Canadian Permanent Force are not exempt from provisions of the Military Service Act and that even officers of the Permanent Force will not be excluded from the provisions of the Act.

The member for Kingston should really have sufficient knowledge of military matters to understand that the soldier of the Permanent Force enlists for general service in any part of the world. He should further be aware that by a recent Order-in-Council the members of the Canadian Permanent Forces have been included as part of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, notwithstanding the fact that they may be retained in Canada for duty. This regulation is embodied in Militia Order No. 106 of 1917.

In view of the above, two logical conclusions may be reached: (1) that the members of the Canadian Permanent Force cannot be conscripted in view of the fact that they are classified as members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force already, and (2) that the Solicitor-General is evading the issue, and in common with the remainder of the Cabinet, willfully misrepresenting the Military Service Bill to the Canadian people.

If Mr. Nickle is really anxious to champion the man in khaki he will relieve the Permanent Force of Military District No. 3 of the misconception which will certainly be placed upon his enquiry in this matter, and in fairness to them he should explain in the House that every soldier of the Permanent Force in this district has used all possible means in his power to proceed overseas.

The Whig is in a position to know that the members of the Permanent Force in Kingston are greatly disappointed because they have not been afforded an opportunity of seeing active service.

The enquiry of Mr. Nickle of the Solicitor-General will undoubtedly be interpreted as an intimation that those members of the Permanent Force who have not yet been allowed to leave Canada are slackers and must be forced to proceed overseas. This is most emphatically wrong.

## At the Theatres

Three recruits for the Army Medical Corps have been signed on in the last two days at Barriefield Camp.

The aeroplane C-616, which was accidentally broken while landing at Barriefield Camp on Friday, was dismantled and taken by motor truck to Deseronto on Saturday morning.

To prevent further accidents in the district, an official landing place is being made at Barriefield Camp on the main parade grounds in front of the administration building. An immense "T" of white-washed boards is being made, and a few trees in the centre of the field have been cut down.

There will now be good landing places for aeroplanes from Deseronto at Napton, Picton and Kingston. Belleville has no good landing place yet.

Capt. E. J. Kyle, who went overseas with the 156th Battalion, was a visitor at headquarters on Saturday morning.

The Volunteer Aid Detachment is evidently very fascinating to the girls of the district, as letters are being received from Gananoque, Brockville and other places from girls volunteering for the work. There are eight girls on duty now, and they are employed in the linen room and in the recreation room. The hospital authorities are very pleased with their work.

Rev. G. Elley Read, Sherbrooke, is conducting a service for the soldiers at Barriefield on Sunday evening in the military Y.M.C.A. tent.

Sergt. L. L. Liscombe, J. Richardson, W. Smalridge and C. Wood, of Kingston, will be in a party of some thirty-five convalescent soldiers to arrive in the city on Monday, according to word received by the M.H.C.C. here.

The Army Medical Corps Depot is taking on every available recruit, and after examination and being outfitted he is sent to the new Queen's Military Hospital for duty.

The Militia Department says that farmers this year will not receive the aid that was given last year by the granting of a month's furlough to soldiers at the camps. There are not enough men to allow it, and conditions have changed.

Capt. C. A. Publow, a Queen's medical graduate, has been transferred from Bramshott Military Hospital to Yarrow Hospital, Broadstairs, England, as chief surgeon.

Capt. H. L. Horsey, who went overseas as chaplain with the 38th Battalion, reported at headquarters on Friday morning. He left on Friday afternoon for Ottawa.

Lieut.-Col. P. G. C. Campbell, who commanded the 253rd Queen's University Highlanders here, has recovered from an attack of bronchitis and has left the hospital. He is convalescing at the home of friends.
