Military News

A number of young men who are eligible for military service are calling on medical men for the purpose of securing certificates of ill-health in order to avoid conscription. "It will make no difference how many family doctor certificates such men secure, they will all have to pass the military doctor's examination," said a military authority this morning. "They may think that by securing a certificate from family doctors that this will release them from duty, but any who think this have another guess coming. Why, even the men who have been given A.R. buttons will have to be re-examined by the military doctors when conscription is put into operation."

The Canadian Patriotic Fund has been issuing buttons of two kinds to soldiers who have been overseas. One has a waving flag, which shows that the wearer has reached England and on his return been honorably discharged. The other shows that the man has reached France and been honorably discharged in Canada. These buttons have to date been issued at Quebec, or where the medical board on the men has been sitting. This practice has been discontinued, and now the men will receive the buttons when the local medical board has decided and reported on their case and their discharge has been made by the Military Hospitals Commission office here.

Staff Sergt. Fields, Sergt. Vincent and Gr. Akerley, who have been on pass from the R.C.H.A. at Petawawa, are returning to their unit on Tuesday.

A new service book for the use of the C.E.F. was used in camp yesterday. It is prepared by Major Starr, Dean of Ontario, and besides the military services, communion service, etc. contains fifty popular hymns and daily readings in the Holy Scriptures for the soldiers used presented in an attractive form, called "Active Service." It has received many favorable comments.

There is to be a meeting of the various units entering teams in the camp baseball league at Camp Headquarters this evening.

Major G. I. Campbell, chief recruiting officer, and Mr. Young, who has been in charge of the recruiting film, "Canada in Khaki," were at headquarters on Monday. Major Campbell and Lieut. Douglas have been showing the film all over the country and at every place an appeal for recruits is made.

The film "Canada in Khaki" was shown at the Mowat Memorial Hospital for the returned soldiers on Saturday evening.

The ladies of the Somme Club are giving a concert for the soldiers at camp in the Military Y.M.C.A. tent on Monday evening.

The returned soldiers who arrived on Monday morning for permanent base duty were taken to the Special Service Company. There are now a large number of men in this unit.

W. J. Carson, civil servant, has enlisted as a private in the Army Medical Corps Training Depot.

Lieut. Willoughby has been appointed medical officer of the next draft from the Railway Construction and Forestry Depot at Ottawa.

In spite of the best efforts to keep the recruiting at a high mark the number dropped in the last two weeks to 145, the lowest on record. The Signalling Training Depot at Ottawa secured the greatest number, having signed up eighty men. The P. P. C. L. I. draft has been transferred to Camp Borden. The recruiting return was as follows: Railway Construction and Forestry Draft, Ottawa, 21; Army Medical Corps Depot, Barrieffield, 12; 24th Battalion draft, Rockland, 6; 253rd Battalion draft, 3; Signalling Depot 80; P. P. C. L. I. Guards draft at Ottawa, 4; 38th Battalion draft, Cornwall, 2; 21st Battalion draft, city, 3; 2nd Battalion draft at Belleville 5; for other districts, 6.
