## WOULD FORCE MEN TO SERVE

Masonic Grand Master Addresses Grand Lodge at Belleville.

### GIVE WELL-EARNED REST

TO THOSE WHO HAVE SERVED SO LONG.

The Masonic Membership Has Increased by 2,650—There is a War Honor Roll of 12,000 Masons. (Special to the Whig.) Belleville, July 18.—"Compulsory service should be enforced," said M. W. Bro. S. A. Luke, retiring Grand Master of the Masonic Lodge of Canada in the Province in addressing the Grand Lodge here to-day at its 62nd annual communication, "let it fall where it may, so that our promise may be fulfilled, that those who have been long on the battlefields, of whom the enemy has said: 'Canadians, why they never retreat or surrender,' may have a well-earned rest and that we may do our part to bring the war to an end."

Of the Ontario Masonic membership of 63,600, an increase of 2,650 over last year, there is an honor roll of about 12,000 names, and many Masons have been wounded and the supreme sacrifice has claimed a saddening but inspiring toll of useful lives.

Grand lodge is meeting in the Belleville armories. Mayor Ketcheson, district deputy grand master, welcomed the delegates to the home of the R. M. Bro. Col. W. N. Pouton, K.C., and Bro. Mackenzie Bowell, the latter a former Premier of Canada and now in his 94th year.

The next grand master in all probability will be W. H. Wardrope, K.C. of Hamilton.

### Military News

The Military Hospitals Commission has been notified to prepare for 10,800 men within the next six months, and this has made necessary a considerable enlargement of the plans which had been made. Add Military.

Brig. Gen. T. D. R. Hemming, commandant of Barrieffield Camp, returned at midnight Wednesday, after attending the funeral of the late Prof. J. Fletcher, Toronto, who passed away on Sunday.

The road over Barrieffield Camp hill has been almost completed by the men of the Special Service Company who have been working under the direction of Lieut. Scott. The road has been graded with very coarse stone which has been consolidated by the big city roller. Over this a screen of lighter stone has been spread and this in turn has been rolled in solidly. Lieut. Scott is now arranging to have this portion finally completed by the application of a heavy coating of oil. He will then continue the work on the stretch to the Cataract causeway.

The stretch from the foot of Barrieffield hill to the Cataract causeway has been closed to traffic. A big pole now lies across the road and all traffic is diverted over the commons crossing the road near the foot of the hill. A vehicle therefore does not run on the main road except in crossing it, at any point between the bridge and the hill.

The total strength of the infantry draft for the 21st Battalion is now 14.

Three men were signed on at the Chief Recruiting Office on Tuesday for the Railroad Construction and Forestry Depot—Ptes. Wood, Rodgers and Thielde of Ottawa.

Col. K. C. Folger, Kingston, Director of Ordnance and Under-Quartermaster General, has been appointed Canadian representative on the British National War Museum and also on the War Trophies Committee at the War Office.

A thorough search is being made in the military hospitals and among returned soldiers who have gone back to civil life, for men who can train the recruits. Sergeant instructors will be paid as high as \$100 a month.

### VIOLENT FIGHTING

On the Galician Front—Russians Forced to Retire.

(Special to the Whig.) Petrograd, July 18.—Violent fighting on the Galician front was reported in to-day's War Office statement, with the enemy forced to a retirement of the Russian line south of Novica.

"South of Novica the enemy occupied a height," the statement said. "We slowly retired our line toward Bereznic. The enemy renewed his attack toward Novica, but our counter-attacks threw him back. The enemy captured a height, which we re-occupied."

### About a Penitentiary Guard.

In the Commons on Monday, the Minister of Justice in reply to Dr. J. W. Edwards, who asked about Underick McDonald, a former penitentiary employee, stated that Mr. McDonald never was a guard or in any way attached to the police staff of the institution. He resigned on Nov. 25th, 1914, at which time his life was despaired of owing to an acute attack of heart trouble. He served in the engineer's department for twenty years and six months and was sixty-two years of age. From May 28th, 1915 he was temporary assistant in the engineer's department and was paid at the rate of \$700 a year.
