STORMS' CORNERS

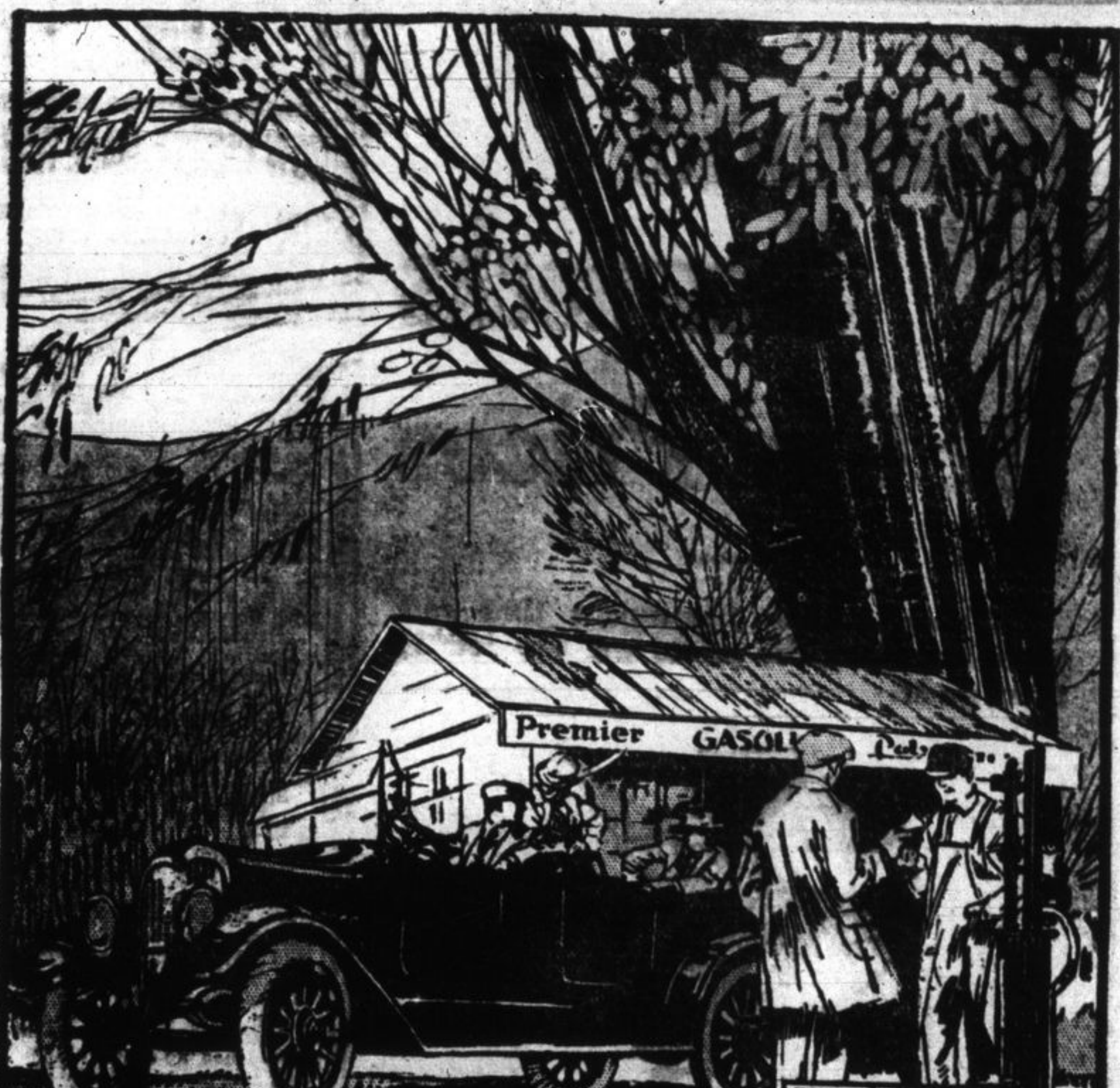
