## CANADIAN NORTHERN DEAL.

The Strangest Opposition to It and Judgment of Parliament. Ottawa, Aug. 10.—With regard to the Canadian Northern Railway these points have been emphasized in parliament: That the common stock, according to the commission report, is not worth anything, and that the government would not be warranted, therefore, in paying \$60,000,000 for it; that a purchase of the road by the Dominion would gratify two ministers, Hon. Mr. Rogers, who had relations with Mackenzie and Mann while he was in the Manitoba government, and Sir Thomas White, whose friends in the financial world would be the beneficiaries; and that arbitration was not to be desired when the value of the road could be reached through the Exchequer Court. The disposition is not to buy the railway, with its unknown liabilities, but to lend it enough to make its betterments and pay its interest, and take the stock as security. The Hydro-Electric Association protest against the C.N.R. deal and in a resolution which must seriously impress, if it does not embarrass, the government.

## EVIDENCE TABLED.

Commons Receives Testimony in Rogers Case. Ottawa, Aug. 10.—When the House resumed Wednesday afternoon Hon. C. J. Doherty laid on the table of the House the evidence in connection with the Macleod-Toller report. Included in this, he said, was the evidence taken by Mr. Justice Galt, which, he declared, was probably the most important part of it.

E. MacDonald asked when the new Pension Act would come up. Sir Thomas White stated that the question was an important and somewhat technical one. He couldn't say to-day when he would introduce the bill.

Sir Thomas White introduced the bill based on the resolution providing for the acquisition of the stock of the Canadian Northern. It received a first reading.

## BORDEN'S BLUNDERS

Leadership of Sir Robert Threatened by Colleagues. Ottawa, Aug. 10.—Premier Borden's leadership of the Conservative party is threatened. Party murmurings, gradually growing in intensity during the past two weeks, are crystallizing into plain speech. Dissatisfaction is beginning to seethe. Conservatives are now grumbling in groups. They talk bitterly about "inertia," "lethargy," "indecision," "blundering," and "lack of leadership."

It is significant that Sir Robert's sharpest critics include members of his own Cabinet. There is amazing unanimity in the expressed opinion that impending Cabinet "reconstruction" should be based upon change of leadership. Conservatives are openly blaming the existing political turmoil on the indecision of the Premier, and claim that their success at the polls is jeopardized by the Borden blunders.

## NEIL McLENNAN IS HERE SURVIVOR OF THE LAKE TRAGEDY ARRIVED AT NOON

He Arranged for the Funerals of the Two Victims Whose Bodies Have Been Recovered.

The 1.40 p.m. G.T.R. train on Friday afternoon brought Neil McLennan to the city to arrange for the funerals of the two victims, George Greaves and Greta Smith, who perished when the schooner George A. Marsh foundered in Lake Ontario.

Mr. McLennan was accompanied by Frank Keegan, Belleville, and at once went to Corbett's undertaking parlors to arrange for the burial of the children. It was decided that George Greaves' body should be sent to Toronto, as requested by his father, and that interment would take place there. The remains of Greta Smith will be sent to her home in Belleville, where her brother, Horace, and her sister, Margaret, await her.

Mr. McLennan could give but few details beyond those that he gave the Whig's representative at Bath, who interviewed him on Wednesday evening. He shows the strain he has been under, but, nevertheless, is bearing up wonderfully. "I have had my full share of sorrow in the death of my wife and little ones," was the only comment he made on his personal loss.

He was visibly affected when he saw the remains of his little nephew. The thought of the whole tragedy was brought to his mind, and it was only with difficulty that he restrained the tears.

It is his opinion that the backwash of the big waves tore his little nephew from the plank to which he was clinging. This plank, he said, had been found near Amherst Island on Friday morning. A big box to which Capt. George Cousins was clinging was also found on the shore.

Mr. McLennan was quite ready to talk but the nervous tension due to his awful experience could be noticed. He appeared interested in the newspaper accounts of the tragedy, which also affected him.

The sorrow-stricken man will likely leave the city on Friday evening for Belleville, where he will take a rest following his horrible experience.

The late Capt. W. J. Smith's two children, who are the sole survivors of a family of nine, are still in Belleville. Questioned as to their condition, Mr. McLennan said that they were bearing up wonderfully under their great burden of sorrow. The young girl has just recently left a hospital in Belleville, but, nevertheless, is displaying remarkable fortitude as is her brother, Horace.

William Smith, the other survivor, who is a brother of the deceased captain, is not so well. He seems to be in the same dazed condition, and cannot yet realize what has happened.

## CHEMICAL WORKS WERE BLOWN UP.

(Special to the Whig.) London, Aug. 10.—Thirteen bodies of women workers have already been recovered, and it is feared others are still in the ruins of the big chemical works, wrecked and burned following a terrific explosion last night. Many others were injured. The works are in East London.

## SPLENDID ACTIVITY IS MANIFESTED

The Germans Are Desperately Trying to Find Out What Is Coming.

By William Phillip Simms, U. P. Correspondent. Paris, Aug. 9.—The Canadians raided the enemy lines north-west of Lens during last night, inching forward a little nearer in tightening their grasp on the approaches to the coal city.

The British let loose gas waves against the Germans along the sand dunes of the Belgian coast.

There were artillery duels and air fights elsewhere, so that with a starry night, followed by a sunshiny day, the warfare along the entire front was given a new vim.

The activity in the air and among the big guns of the artillery is especially marked. The Germans are desperately trying to ascertain what changes have been made in the British front since the unspokeable weather began. Their aeroplanes take to the air in search for this information, but British planes immediately go after them and fights are numerous.

The enemy heavily shelled the British lines north-east of Loos during last night. The Ypres and Cambines canal region was also under heavy fire, as was the Lombard-Tyzyde sector near the coast.
