**ENDOWMENT OF \$100,000 TO HELP INDUSTRIAL FAIR INCIDENTS OF THE DAY**

QUEEN'S SUMMER SCHOOL HOPES TO RAISE IT.

In Order to Add to the Curriculum, and to Lessen the Cost of the Course to the Students.

A plan is being considered by the executive of Queen's University Summer school to raise an endowment of \$100,000 for the purpose of adding four more classes to the curriculum of the school, to make a refund of \$10 to each registered student to spend \$1,000 annually in advertising, and to be able to divide \$1,000 in railway refunds to students coming from the maritime provinces or west of Winnipeg.

The objects of the fund are to lessen the cost of the course to the student earning less than one thousand dollars a year, to increase the number of classes to include all those necessary for a pass degree to provide facilities for post graduate work, to increase the honorarium to professors teaching at the summer school and give assistance to these students who come from long distances.

**NEW ROADWAY TO CAUSEWAY.**  
Was Completed on Monday and Opened to Traffic.  
The new asphalt macadam roadway to the causeway from Tete de Pont barracks gate was completed on Monday and opened to traffic in the afternoon. It was started six weeks ago, and City Engineer McClelland pushed the work ahead as quickly as possible, and, aided by fine weather, succeeded in finishing the pavement within the time anticipated. The new roadway is a creditable approach to the causeway. The old road was in terrible condition, and the City Council did well in ordering that the approach be constructed this summer. The road is also a credit to the city engineer, who has received much praise from the Ontario Department of Highways for the excellence of the University avenue pavement constructed last year. The causeway approach is twenty-six feet wide, and curbing has been built on either side. It is up to the military authorities to see that the boulevards are kept in good condition.  
There was no official opening of the roadway, although it is said that Aid. Newman was desirous that Mayor Hughes should officiate and sprinkle the pavement with the contents of a bottle of invalid wine.
