Discussion arose as to the advisability of the Commission withdrawing its office from the City Buildings. This would mean a loss of \$400 revenue by the city and \$320 more in rent would have to be paid for the Princess street store, which would also be used as a showroom for electrical wares. Further consideration will be given the matter, and the special committee will in the meantime make a report.

Two petitions were received protesting against the Commission es tablishing a showroom on Princess street. One was from the electrical dealers themselves and the other from hardware merchants handling electrical wares. They pointed out that such action on the part of the Commission would result in injuring private enterprise. The Commission will consider this phase of the matter when it deals with the report to be made by the special committee.
