WHY SAILORS OF BRITAIN CANNOT ASSOCIATE WITH GERMAN MANS AT STOCKHOLM

Hin Murders Cited—Havelock Wilson Issues Document on Some Recent Piratical Doings.

London, Aug. 16.—Havelock Wilson, president of the National Seamen's Union, in a statement prepared for the Associated Press, gave the reasons why British seamen cannot fraternize with Germans at Stockholm, or anywhere else.

The document is an account of recent sinkings of British vessels in which German submarines fired upon open boats or otherwise savagely mistreated the hapless crews.

It was explained that no attempt had been made to make a complete list, but that examples had been selected more or less haphazardly, to illustrate the reasons for the attitude of the seamen's and fishermen's union towards parleys with the enemy.

The first instance picked out was the already familiar case of the British ship Belgian Prince. The statement says:

"The Belgian Prince was sunk by a submarine July 21st. The lifeboats were broken up by the Germans and the survivors were thrown into the sea after being deprived of their lifeboats. Forty men were drowned.

"The British steamship Kildale was sunk April 12th. Fifteen shells were fired at the boats while they were pulling clear of the ship, killing one seaman.

"The British steamship Westminster was sunk December 14th. The boats were severely shelled by the submarine, the captain and mate being killed.

"The British steamship Eastevstone was sunk February 3rd. The submarine's guns were turned on the boats, firing shrapnel shells, fragments of which swept both boats, killing the master, steward and three others, and seriously injuring the second officer.

"The British steamship Adah was sunk June 15th. The submarine fired on the master's boat, killing eight men. After the boat had been sunk and the men were swimming about in the water, the submarine again fired shrapnel shells at them."

Do Not Contemplate Endowment.
Kingston, Aug. 16.—(To the Editor): Since the matter has been in excellent prominence it seems necessary to state that Queen's Summer School students do not contemplate raising an endowment.

It may interest your readers, however, to know that the Arts students have something in the air. They are organizing to advertise the Summer School, and hence, the University. So far as we can learn no other body of students has ever taken similar action. We have contributed this \$11 for this purpose, and in all, since 1912, over \$750.

It also occurs to me that since the Summer School students of Queen's have brought into Kingston an average of at least \$10,000 for the past three years, it might not be bad business for the city to contribute \$10,000 or even more to this or some other department of the University.

FRONTENAC CHEESE BOARD.
Sales Made at 21 3-16 Cents at Meeting on Thursday.

Cheese sold at 21 3-16 cents on the Frontenac Cheese Board on Thursday afternoon. There were boarded 467 boxes of white cheese, and 101 boxes of colored as follows:

White—Inverary, 30; Forest, 40; Glenvale, 60; Howe Island, 30; Ontario, 32; Silver Springs, 90; Thousand Island, 50; Verona, 50; Frontenac, 75; Collins Bay, 40.

Colored—Eggenburg, 35; Wolfe Island, 66.

At 21 3-16 cents John Gibson purchased the offering of Frontenac, Ontario, Silver Springs, Verona and Wolfe Island.

At the same price L. W. Murphy bought the offering of Howe Island, Ontario, Thousand Islands and Eggenburg.

Complaint was made by one of the salesmen about the prices paid on the local board being lower than that paid on other boards.

"I am not complaining about the price to-day," he said, "if you had at the time you will find that on all other boards a higher price has been given. I think that we should get as high a price here as any place, and that is the reason I am speaking about it."
