Put in a cheesecloth bag one half tencupfull of whole English mustard seed, two tablespoonfuls each of whole alispice, cloves, and black peppe, one-half teacupful oinnamon sticks and boil with a little vinegar. Measure sufficient vinegar to cover the cucumbers well. Add a pound of brown sugar, scald and pour over pickles, repeating for five consecutive days.
