Lieut. M. J. Kennedy, of Kingston, is to be taken on the strength at Spadina Convalescent Home, Toronto. He is a son of Councillor Kennedy, Port Huron.

Captain Geoffrey Gordon Chrysler, Ottawa, awarded the Military Cross, graduated at the Royal Military College, and enlisted with the Queen's Own Battalion at Toronto, with which he went overseas as a lieutenant. He suffered the amputation of a leg, and is now in an English hospital.

TWO AEROPLANES CRASH

BARRFIELD CAMP LANDINGS ONCE MORE A JONAH

Both Machines of the Royal Flying Corps Come to Grief—Neither of the Aviators Was Injured.

Just at 6 o'clock on Sunday morning two aeroplanes appeared over Barrfield camp and hovered overhead for several minutes. One of the machines appeared to have a defective engine and it descended. The other machine followed its example and also came to the ground.

Mechanics from the Army Service Corps Mechanical Transport were called and the engine was repaired by cleaning and readjusting the spark-plugs until it apparently ran much smoother. The pilot then ascended to try out the machine. He made two circles but the engine continued to work badly, and finally stopped dead. The pilot was flying very low and came to earth very well under the circumstances. The machine touched the ground, sprang into the air and then came to a stop on its nose, the propeller and engine being badly smashed in the accident. The aviator was unharmed.

The other aeroplane meanwhile decided to return to the camp. It was on soft ground on the western parade ground. The engine was running and the driver wished to move to a better place for the ascent. He asked some people standing near to guide the tail of the plane around. They lifted it too high and that machine smashed its propeller.

An S.O.S. call to the camp resulted in a truck coming down from Deseronto. The truck carried a new propeller for the second machine and that aviator was able to fly back to the camp. The other machine had to be dismantled and taken back in parts.
