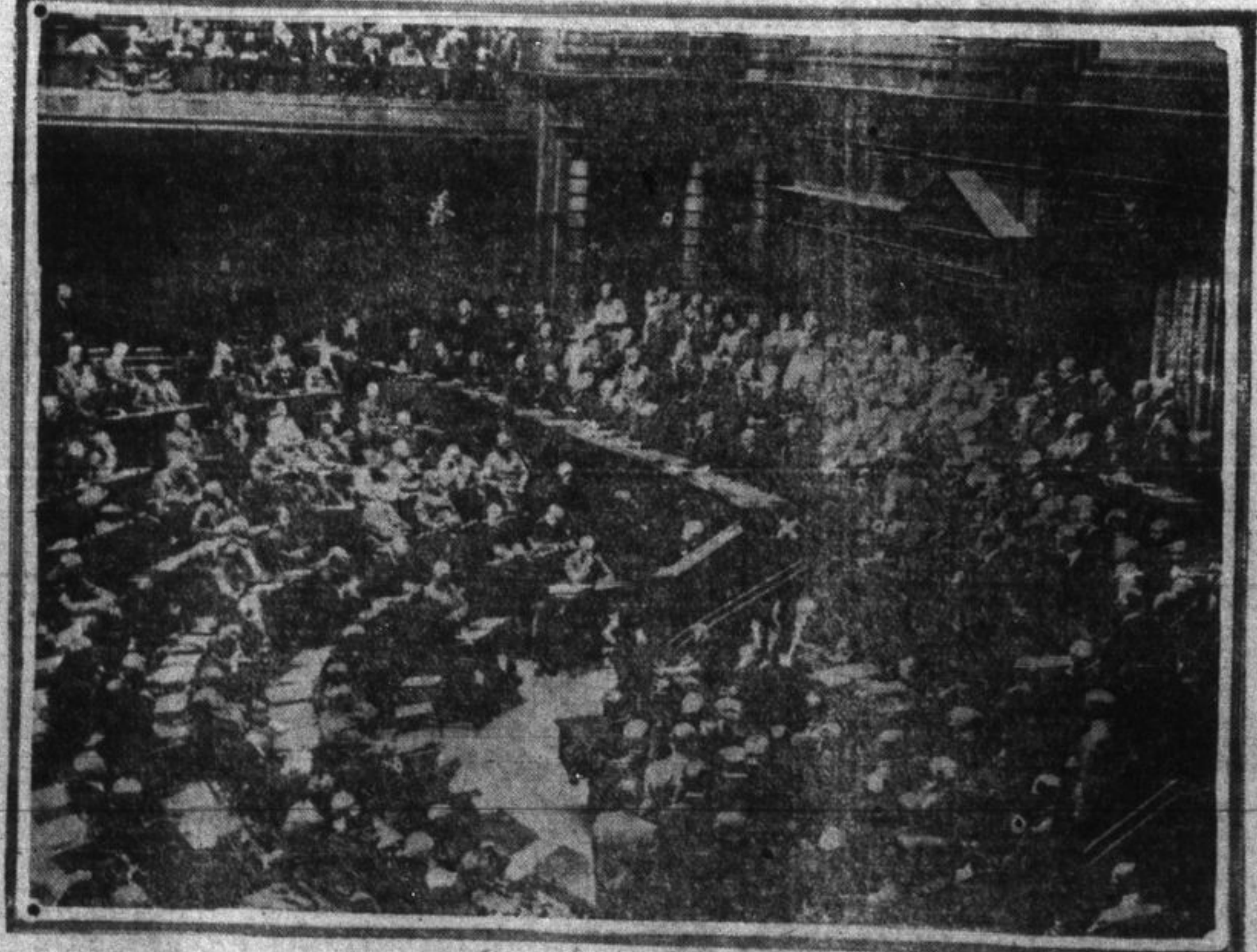
POOLE'S RESORT

Young Man From Easton's Corners Named for Important Duties. Brockville, Sept. 7.—J. R. Spry, B.S.A., who has had charge during the past three years of the drainage propaganda carried on by the Ontario Department of Agriculture, has been appointed farm director in place of Samuel Todd, who resigned to take up his duties with the food controller. Mr. Spry will have supervision of the farms administered by the pro-

vincial secretary which aggregate over 4,000 acres and produce a large variety of food stuffs used in the various institutions.

Mr. Spry is a member of a prominent family of Easton's Corners and took a course at the Ontario Agricultural College, from which he graduated several years ago.
