At the hospital surgical aid was given by Dr. R. J. Gardiner and Dr. Robinson. The man's hand and arm was badly lacerated, and he was not able to return to his home until Tuesday afternoon.

PTE. C. J. M'KANE

A PRISONER OF WAR He Was Reported Killed—His Brother Receives Card From Him.

On Wednesday morning Mrs. William G. McKane, Clergy street west, was delightfully surprised at receiving a card from her son, Pte. C. J. McKane, who in June had been officially reported killed. The family were in mourning for the gallant young soldier, and the news that he was alive came to them as a great shock, and has turned their mourning into joy.

Pte. McKane went overseas with the 13th C.M.R., and transferred to the 18th Battalion in France. On the 28th May last he was reported missing, and in June the word came from Ottawa that he was dead. The card received by the family is dated the 20th of June, and has been nearly three months in coming. It is not known in what prison camp in Germany Pte. McKane is interned.
