REMAINED FOR SENTENCE

ALLAN PETERS WAS FOUND GUILTY OF A SERIOUS OFFENCE

Cried Bitterly When Magistrate Announced His Decision in Police Court on Tuesday Morning—Another Case of Invalid Wine Before the Court.

Magistrate Farrell, on Tuesday morning, found Allan Peters, guilty of committing an assault on a five-year old girl, and remanded him for a week for sentence.

Peters broke into tears, as he was led away to the cells. From the time he was arrested, he has declared that he is innocent. The little girl positively identified him as the man who made the assault upon her.

Thomas F. Spencer made his second appearance before the Magistrate in a week, on a charge of being intoxicated. He was arrested on Monday night by Constables Daniel McCarey and Leslie Clark. When arraigned before the Magistrate, he pleaded guilty, but when asked where he secured his liquor, declared that he had no liquor, but that he had been drinking port wine.

"It is liquor all right so long as it intoxicates you," remarked Magistrate Farrell.

Then the Cadi started to question Spencer as to where he secured his liquor.

Spencer is a returned soldier, and told the Magistrate that a boy got it for him while he was in the hospital undergoing treatment.

"Who was the boy who got it for you?" "I don't know his name." "Well, I will remand you to give you a chance to find the man," said the Magistrate.

While on his way out of the court room the Magistrate asked the accused if he would pick out the person who had given him liquor, and he said that perhaps he could.

Spencer, on his former appearance was fined \$200 and costs, with the option of three months in Jail. As he was in need of medical treatment, the jail physician had him removed to the hospital.

Officers, non-commissioned officers and men who are on furlough and all others who for reasons are not attached to any particular unit in Canada are directly responsible to the general or other officer commanding the district in which they are, and he is considered for all purposes of discipline as their commanding officer.

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The Theatres

At the Grand. Despite the uninviting title of the feature film at the Grand Opera House on Monday evening a large audience was present to see "The Public Be Damned." Like its title the picture itself is distinctly unconventional and honestly tries to give information to the same long-suffering public on a very present question—food control. Some of the incidents in the plays are perhaps a trifle exaggerated, such as a mother dying with her infant at a food control meeting, but on the whole the general outline has much of interest and profit for the theatregoer.

For once the sinful capitalist—the role taken by Charles Richmond—is placed in a pleasing part. Through his love for the food control agitator, Mary Fuller, and in spite of his greed for gain obtained by the suffering of the poor, the capitalist even allows his business to go to ruination that he might win her respect and admiration.

The picture is essentially one portraying the weakness of humanity, and it must be admitted that the male of the species comes off second best to the female in this picture. The duplicity and hypocrisy of the food trust executives, the traitorous motives that come to the middle class man because of his worship of mammon and desire for position and the sufferings and anguish in the slums of the large cities in these times of high prices are realistically shown in "The Public Be Damned."

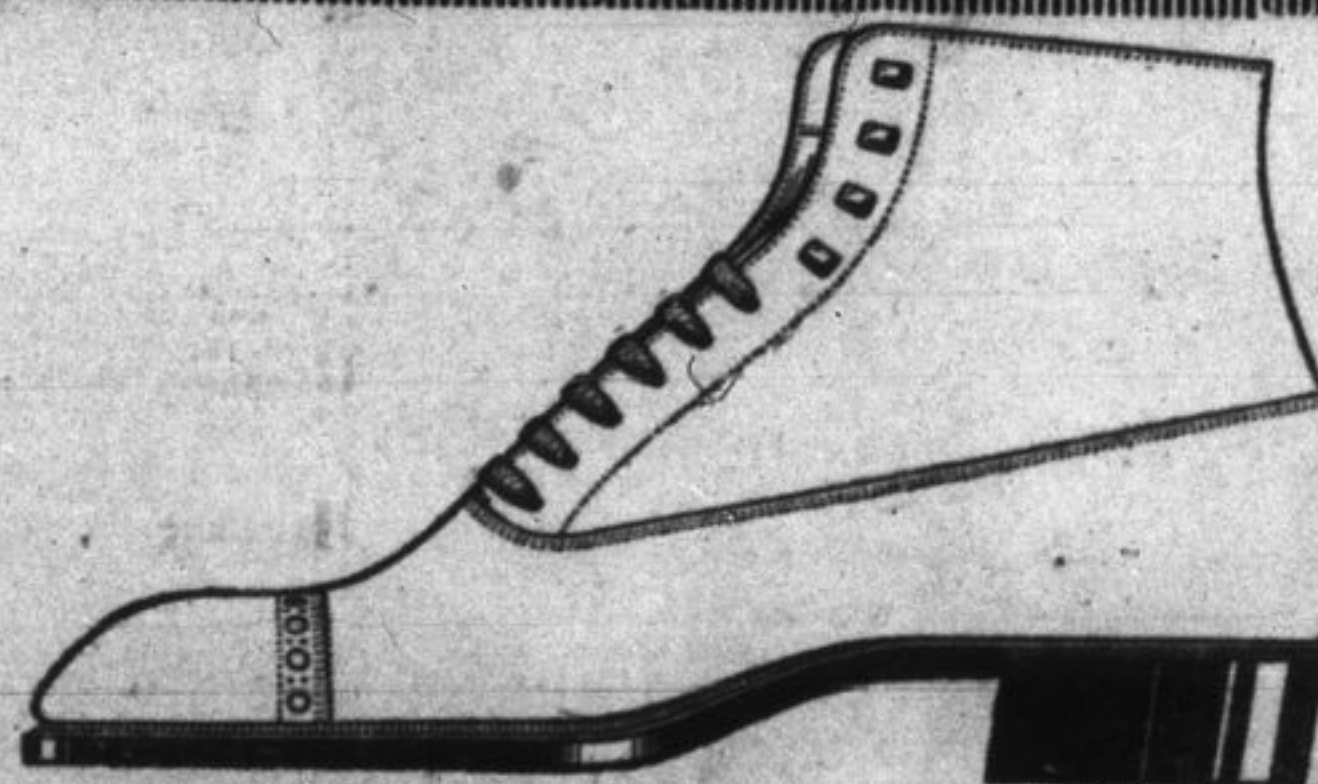
