## Military News

The I.S. of I. examinations will commence on Monday.

Sergt. L. P. Reading and Sergt. W. J. Sharpe have been granted leave for several days.

Brassards to be worn by the staff of the Y.M.C.A. have been authorized and will admit the wearers to camp without further permit.

Owing to the reconstruction work, the Barrieffield road has been closed at the hill.

Soccer was again on the boards last night. The Eastern Depot battalion boys booted the ball in a snappy, practice game.

Wednesday afternoon next has been given over as a holiday in camp in order to allow the boys in khaki to take in the Fair.

Both of the ball teams will be working out this afternoon, and will walk on the diamond Wednesday prepared for a great contest.

Another crowded house greeted last evening's show at the Military "Y." Six reels of "movies" were loaned from Griffin's and the Strand, and were shown before the Salvation Army band arrived. The band gave unsparingly and were well received.

The 75th Battery which will winter in Kingston will be able to muster a strong rugby team. "Pep" Paisley, former McGill star Howard Webster of Toronto Varsity, and Martin Kilt being some of the well-known football players who are members of the unit.

Capt. Edward Ryan, M.O. for 'D' Unit, M.H.C.C., Toronto, is on leave of absence.

Men of Canada who are affected by the Military Service Act, are to be required to carry their examination papers with them on the street or when they leave their homes.

Judge Lavell has appointed Archibald Staley and Addison Miller of Arden to Wolfe Island and Ardloch district military service tribunals respectively.

Col. William R. Sample, in command at Madison Barracks, N.Y., received word that eight companies of the Quartermaster Corps are to be organized at that post. Each company will consist of 250 men, making 2,000 men in all.

## PUTTING UP STIFF FIGHT

TO SEEK RELEASE OF TWO CONVICTS AT THE "PEN"

Brother of Famous Mecum Boys is Endeavoring to Have Them Released and Deported to Their Former Home in States.

An endeavor is being made to have Kelly and Jones, two of the western desperados, in the Portsmouth penitentiary, released and deported to the States, their former home, but whether or not the attempt will be successful is hard to say, although from what can be learned at the present time, there is not very much chance of it being brought about.

Although giving the names of Kelly and Jones, they also went under the name of Mecum brothers, and it is stated that they have a well-to-do brother living in the Southern States, who is putting up a lot of money in a fight to seek the release of the two men.

The prisoners were brought down from Stoney Mountain penitentiary, some years ago, and created quite a sensation by the part they took in a daring daylight escape from the penitentiary at Portsmouth.

For their part in the escape, long terms were added to their already severe sentence for crime in the west.
