Dunn, who was recently killed in France, was born at Newburgh, on May 19th, 1894. He enlisted on Jan. 29th, 1916, in "D" Company, 146th Battalion, later receiving his stripes as corporal. When he reached England he found his chums were drafted into the 95th Reserve Battalion, so he gave up his stripes to go with the boys. Later he was transferred into the Canadian Mounted Rifles, serving six months with them in the trenches. Beside his parents and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Sewell, he leaves three brothers; Gunner John C. Dunn, overseas, and Francis and Milton at home.

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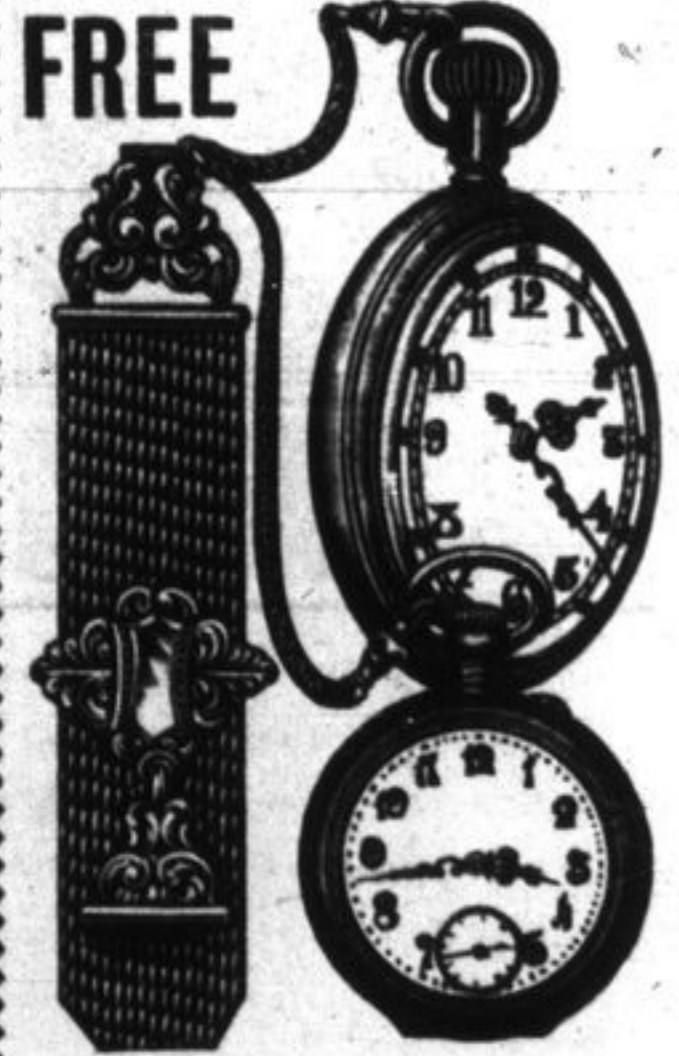
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
