TROUBLES OF A SOLDIER
IN GETTING HIS PAY—BRIG-GEN. HEMMING ASSISTS

Officialdom and Red Tape Hamper Artificer Adams, Sgt to Canada—Wife Seriously Ill in England.

The Ottawa Citizen says: After serving three years in France and being wounded twice and gassed, Artificer G. A. Adams, C. A. S. C., believes he has a real and legitimate "kick" over the red tape through which he says he has been struggling in vain to get his back pay and his discharge from the service. He is now in Ottawa in mufti and with a temporary discharge secured after much chasing to and fro between here and Kingston, trying to negotiate a loan of some money through the Soldiers' Aid Commission to help him get across to England, where his wife is lying seriously ill.

After serving in the 28th Battalion and the Army Service Corps in France since the beginning of the war and being wounded and gassed, as above stated, he was sent for convalescence to Hastings, in the south of England. Here he met a girl, with whom he fell in love and eventually, after prolonged negotiation with the militia authorities, secured permission to marry her, which he did.

He went before a medical board in England and was declared medically unfit and entitled to his discharge after his honorable services. Through some over-lapping of medical officialdom in England he did not obtain this discharge but, instead, eighteen days after he had been married, was sent back to Canada. Here he has been for two months trying to get his discharge and separation allowance to which he feels he is entitled, but it was in vain until Brigadier-General T. D. R. Hemming of Kingston heard his story and managed to get him a temporary discharge in order to return to England to be with his wife, who is ill. He has been trying to get the money which is coming to him, amounting to about \$275, but says he cannot. One official told him that unless he would give a Canadian address he wouldn't get it and cannot do this as his address is in England, although he served in the Canadian army. He said there are so many departments and branches through which an application for discharge and back pay has to pass that he despairs of ever getting it. In addition, he was compelled to pay for a passport to get out of Canada to return to England. "Is it fair that a soldier should have to pay for a passport to get out of the country he has fought and bled for?" Artificer Adams wants to know.
