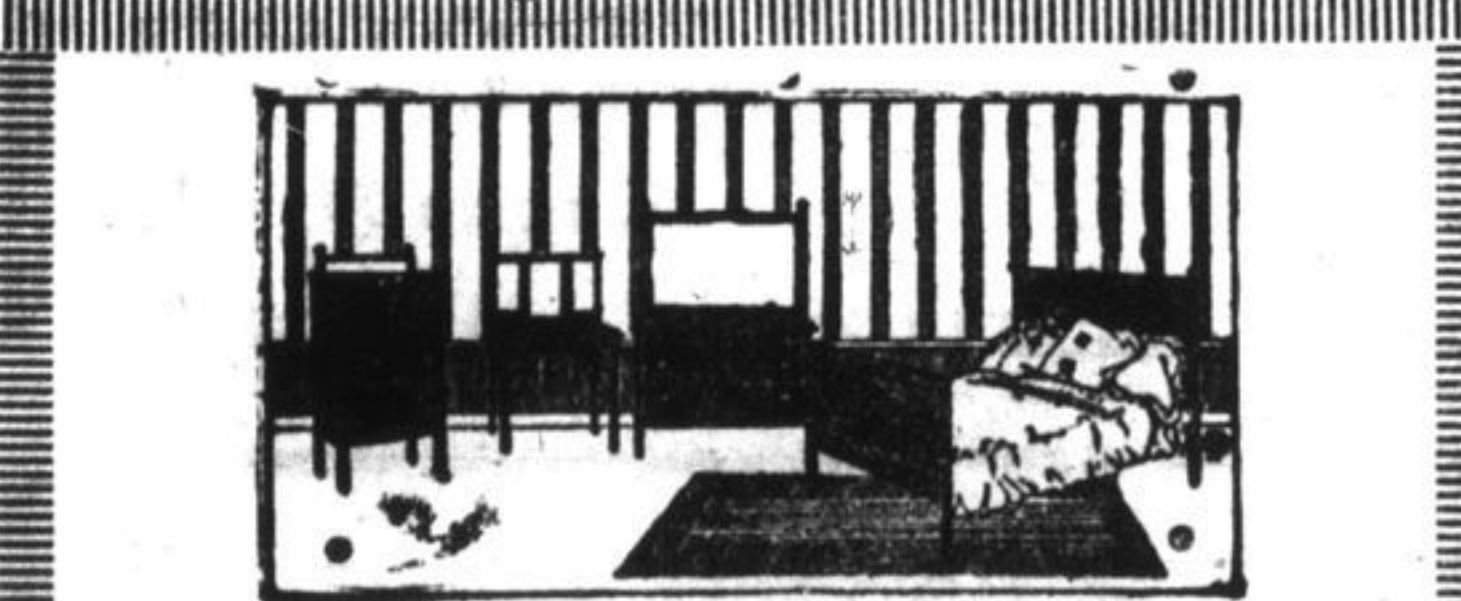

Accident on the Race Track—Fire in Midway Tent—The Balloon Ascension Was Again Successful

The third day of the Kingston Industrial Exhibition was of the same high standard as the two previous days. The crowd must have numbered 8,000.

The horse races created much interest as probably never before have such contests been staged here. In several of the heats the horses covered the full two rounds of the track with only a few inches between them. Three abreast and all fighting for the premier position characterized some of the contests.

In the second heat of the named race a regrettable accident occurred.

At the customary signal the aeronaut cut loose with his parachute and taking the two drops landed safely.
